OTTAWA (CP)—The Victorian Order of Nurses will offer bursaries of \$750 each to assist graduate nurses who want to enter the public service organization. The bursaries were announced Tuesday at a meeting of the order's management committee.

—In discussion on the Chukkar partridge brought into the Island by the association, various members of the Prince County Fish and Game Association at Kensington on Wednesday evening expressed the opinion that the provincial association should establish a game farm on Prince Edward Island for the purpose of raising Chukkar partridge, Hungarian partridge, and pheasants could be released in various sections of the province to replenish and supplement the upland game population.

The meeting went on record in supporting a recommendation from the Queen's County Association suggesting the holding a provincial plebiscite to determine hunting seasons acceptable to the majority of island gunners. If acted on, it is proposed to conduct this plebiscite through a form inserted in the newspapers which can be clipped, completed, and mailed to the secretary of the provincial association.

The meeting expressed satisfaction with the association's fish restocking program in regard to the trout fingerling and salmon fry released in the county during the past year, and members felt that this is a very important project due to the numbers of fish caught by so many anglers.

Theft of Cheques Gets Juveniles Into Trouble

Keys forgotten in a post office box at Summerside gave several juveniles the opportunity to get themselves into serious trouble.

While loitering around the lobby of the post office they discovered keys to the box of a Summerside business firm had been forgotten in the lock at the post office box.

Opening the box they removed letters, one of which, when opened was found to contain a number of cheques to an amount exceeding \$200.

These cheques were ones that had been cashed by a merchant some distance from Summerside, and were being sent to the Summerside firm as payment on their account. They included old age, family allowance, unemployment, and personal cheques which had been endorsed at least once when accepted by the merchant.

The young lads began a tour of the town calling at numerous stores and places of business before locating a lady who cashed two of the cheques for the boys in the belief that they were on an errand for the rightful owner.

In the subsequent investigation by members of the Summerside Police Force certain of the cheques which had proven difficult for the boys to get cashed was found torn up and almost hidden by the falling snow where it was dropped on the main street.

Police also learned that more than a half dozen young lads, all under the age of sixteen, had participated in the incident or had knowledge of it. One such lads happened to be reported to have been paid five dollars by the ring-leaders to keep quiet.

It is expected that those responsible for the theft and cashing of the cheques will appear in juvenile court.

Police officials indicated yesterday that care should be taken by everyone who makes certain that the key to their post office box has been removed from the lock after they have taken mail from the box; reasonable care, they said should also be taken by everyone when requested to cash cheques for juveniles. A few questions may sometimes discover whether a legitimate service would be performed by cashing such cheques and if any doubt remains it may be advisable to decline and to advise police of the incident.
