

Long Summer For Collie As He Awaits Rabies Outcome

MATTAWA, Ont. (CP) — Its going to be a long summer for Teddy — if he lives through it. The two-year-old collie was sent to a six-month quarantine after killing a fox which threatened to attack seven children on their way home from school Feb. 19.

Health officials at North Bay, disclosed that examination of the dog's head had determined the animal was rabid.

Teddy, who had been tied up in a shed of the farm of Armitage Blake near Mattawa, received a shot of anti-rabies vaccine after

angling with the fox. But since rabies symptoms do not develop up to six months after contact with an infected animal, it is unlikely the dog will be let loose before the end of August.

Although it is not believed the dog was bitten by the fox, veterinarians said there is a chance it may develop rabies and die.

Teddy's young masters, Armand and Eugene Blake, are themselves undergoing treatment for rabies. Along with the other five small children who handled the dead fox after the collie killed it, they are receiving daily injections of serum

as part of the Pasteur treatment. The treatment was started March 5 and the children will continue receiving the painful stomach-muscle injections until March 18.

Officials said four persons in North Bay were bitten by dogs last week. The dogs were placed under observation.

Agriculture department officials here said they are receiving numerous reports of foxes leaving the bush and attacking dogs in rural areas. Dogs known to have been in contact with them are either quarantined or destroyed.

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Fish Landings Up In January

OTTAWA (CP) — Landings of sea fish in January rose four per cent to 137,658,000 pounds from 132,372,000 in the corresponding month last year, the bureau of statistics said Monday.

Value of the catch also rose seven per cent to \$3,502,000 from \$3,258,000.

The Atlantic catch in January totalled 43,433,000 pounds worth \$2,063,000, compared with 33,234,000 pounds valued at \$1,907,000 a year ago. The British Columbia catch declined to 94,225,000 pounds from 99,138,000 but the value rose to \$1,439,000 from \$1,351,000.
