Boston Climbs With Win Over New York; Brooks Maintain Fast Pace In National

NEW YORK (AP)—Home runs by Billy Klaus and Grady Hatton powered Boston to a 4-1 victory over New York in the frantic American League race Tuesday night, boosting the persistent Red Sox to within four percentage points of the Yankees, who fell to third place.

The Red Sox managed just three hits off southpaw Whitey Ford through the first eight innings, but were ahead all the way on Klaus' smash in the first inning after Billy Goodman had led off with a walk, and Hatton's solo shot in the fourth.

Willard Nixon walked off with his fourth victory over New York in five decisions this season, safely scattering six hits.

BROOKLYN (AP)—Veteran reliever Marv Grissom forced in a run with two out and the bases loaded in the 10th inning Tuesday night to enable Brooklyn Dodgers to edge New York Giants 3-2.

Grissom pitched to only two batters after taking over from Paul Giel with two out and two on. Pinch hitter Don Newcombe scratched a single over third to load the sacks—his eighth hit in 17 times at bat as a pinch hitter—and Grissom walked Don Hoak on four straight pitches for the game.

Ruben Gomez went nine innings for the Giants before giving way to a pinch hitter. Giel came on in the 10th and promptly got Gil Hodges and Jackie Robinson out then Carl Furillo and Don Newcombe setting the stage for Newcombe's hit.

The Giants took a 2-0 lead in the first inning with Willie Mays hitting his 36th home run after Whitey Lockman had singled.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Cleveland Indians bunched two walks with singles by George Strickland and Al Smith and a double by Gene Woodling to score four runs off Ned Garver in the second inning Wednesday night and beat Detroit Tigers 4-2.

The triumph moved the Tribe into second place in the American League a half game ahead of New York Yankees who lost to Boston 4-1.

Mary MacLennan In Tie At Canadian Rifle Shoot

SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—A crack lady shot from Prince Edward Island was scheduled to shoot-off Wednesday night against an Ontario artillery major in a major match at the 73rd annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize shoot.

More than 600 contestants took to the firing line Tuesday to shoot 20 rounds each in the banker's match—the first event of the week-long meet fired from 600 yards at the Connaught Rifle ranges 14 miles west of Ottawa.

When the last round was fired and officials tallied the scores, Lieut. Mary MacLennan of Alexandria, P.E.I. and Maj. Gerald E. Keeler of the Picton, Ont., artillery school were tied for first place with 99 points of a possible 100.

A shoot-off at dusk Wednesday was scheduled to break the tie. Capt. F. Drysdale of Victoria, B.C. placed third in the match fired under service conditions and one of the events counted in determining aggregate scores for the meet's major prizes.

The 32-year-old army medical corps lieutenant shot in England as a member of Canada's 1951 Biscley team. Officials said she was the only woman ever to qualify for the squad.

Membership on next year's 18-man team—one of the meet's major prizes will be decided Saturday by aggregate scores on various events shot during the week.

Contestants shot the Borden in two relays of 330 each using one-third of a mile of firing line. They fired their .303 calibre service rifles under a blazing sun and clear sky, and strong heat mirage affected riflemen.

ANOTHER TIE
A later match also required a Wednesday night shoot-off as four marksmen tied with perfect 100 scores.

The match, shot for the Macdougall Challenge Cup also will count in championship aggregates. Tied in the event, which attracted almost 700 entries, were J.L. Wise of Rose Park, South Australia, a member of Australia's Reservist Rifle Club; Pte. J.W. Lightburn of the Seaford Highlands, Mission, B.C.; W.O. J. McLeod of the Queen's Own Rifles, Toronto, and CPO Douglas R. Clarke, of Shannon Park, N.S.

Clarke, a naval Atlantic command rifle club crack shot, Monday won both Borden and Sherwood service conditions matches in two evening shoot-offs.

Macdougall competitors fired 10 rounds from 200 yards and another 10 from 500 in the match which attracted nearly 700 competitors.
