# Canadian Content For TV To Be Cut During Summer

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian content requirement for television would be reduced to 45 per cent from 55 per cent in the period of May 27 to Oct. 13 under a proposal announced here by the Board of Broadcast Governors.

The BBG also announced it will put a floor of 40 per cent on Canadian content in the period 6 p.m. to midnight instead of its original proposal for a minimum of 45 per cent starting next Oct. 1 and 55 per cent a year later.

The over-all requirement for Canadian content in programming every four weeks rose to 55 per cent last April 1 after being held at 45 per cent for a year. The BBG's proposal now is to revert to 45 per cent for the summer viewing period.

The proposal will be considered at the next public sitting of the government in Ottawa starting Tuesday, May 29.

RECEIVE STATEMENTS  
The BBG said in a statement it has been receiving "financial information" from the so-called second television stations in eight cities since they were set up.

"Although their position at this stage is generally less satisfactory than they had anticipated it would be, the stations

generally are reducing their losses," the BBG said. Improvement was most evident in the winter months.

"When the stations have become fully established, they will be in a position to meet this problem within the general regulations requiring 55 per cent Canadian content in each four-week period throughout the year," the BBG said.

"However, it has been apparent to the board that the summer of 1962 will be a particularly difficult period; and that some relief should be provided in this period."

## Labor Festival Planned In U.K.

LONDON (CP)—The Labor party has unveiled details of its June festival of labor aimed at demonstrating that the movement thinks of more than bread alone.

Jazz and classical musicians, Eskimo artists, avant garde painters, athletes and dramatists have been enlisted to get the message across.

The two week festival opening June 14—the first of its kind in Britain—will be staged in a variety of London locales prior

to a tour of smaller British cities.

Party Leader Hugh Gaitskell said the festival will not be heavy on political content.

The program itself includes only one political meeting where some of Labor's chief spokesmen are to speak. But party officials are hopeful the festival will convey the idea that the movement has a deep interest in music and the arts.

Eskimo sketches are to be included in a display of 200 works of graphic arts from a variety of countries.

## Kennedy Trade Plans Praised

WASHINGTON (CP)—W. S. Kirkpatrick of Montreal, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, said here Canadian businessmen are "encouraged" by the trade liberalization program proposed by President Kennedy's administration.

He made the statement in an address to the foreign policy luncheon at the annual meeting of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Kirkpatrick described the

U.S. liberalization plan as "a bold new program" and said it implemented it "would undoubtedly stimulate trade throughout the world with consequent benefit to many countries including Canada."

He said Canada's economy is of course particularly sensitive to the U.S. trade policy and greater access to U.S. markets "would be a most desirable development for Canada."

Canada's high trade deficit with the U.S. was harmful, last year the deficit was \$600,000,000 and while it was offset by a favorable trade balance with other countries, Mr. Kirkpatrick said, "this position is becoming increasingly difficult to maintain as other nations work towards balancing trade with us."

## TO HOLD EXERCISES

OTTAWA (CP)—A joint Canadian-United States military exercise involving 10,000 men will be held on the Alaska Highway next February, the army announced Wednesday.

The manoeuvre, called Polar Pass, is designed to test winter warfare techniques, air transport and mobility and sea transport training.

## CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been:

West North East South  
1 ♠ Dblc Pass  
2 ♠ 2 ♠ 3 ♠ 4 ♠ 5 ♠

What would you now bid with each of the following five hands?

- ♠ QJ865 ♥ 852 ♦ 2 ♣ AJ4
- ♠ J74 ♥ KJ7 ♦ KJ82 ♣ 853
- ♠ Q73 ♥ J8652 ♦ 73 ♣ 984
- ♠ 973 ♥ QJ94 ♦ A36 ♣ K85
- ♠ J952 ♥ 3 ♦ KQ74 ♣ AQ86

1. Two spades. The most usual way of showing strength in response to a takeout double is to jump the bidding. The double shows at least an opening bid. If we were to respond one spade with this hand and also respond one spade with, say, SJ84 H9642 DQ3 C87, partner would be hard put to know which type of hand we held.

Our hand strongly suggests the possibility of game. Though we have only 8 points in high cards, the distribution brings the value of the hand up to at least 12 points, particularly since partner practically guarantees spade support and is probably short in hearts.

2. One notrump. This hand has more high-card points, but far less promise of game. The choice lies between responding
