GIVE BEARINGS

"Like other such stations, Radio Marine at Seal Island is operated by the Department of Transport and its call letters are VGY, sending out signals to ships so they can figure out correct bearings. Naturally, the importance of these stations in the aid of navigation cannot be overemphasized, and operators such as "Steve" Ahearn play a most important part in the safety of ships plying along the coastline. Messages from the islands are relayed to the "parent" station at Rockville, near Yarmouth.

"VGY operates three frequencies, 500 kilocycles for distress and other messages, 410 kilocycles for direction finding, and 308 is the beacon frequency. Maintenance requires constant attention.

"The Ahearns live in a modern five-room bungalow close to the station, which in turn is next to the Seal Island lighthouse. Electric power is available only when the power for the operation of the lighthouse is turned on. Mr. Ahearn spends much time in his station and has no relief help.

"Both Mr. and Mrs. Ahearn are music lovers, although neither has had formal training. Self-taught, Mr. Ahearn plays the violin and Mrs. Ahearn the piano-accordion, the latter a birthday present from her husband.

HOBBIES

"In the hobby line, Mr. Ahearn likes woodworking, his specialty being bird houses, weather vanes and miniature lighthouses. Mrs. Ahearn spends much time with her flowers.

"During the lobster season, many fishermen come to the island with their families from Clark's Harbour. For the remainder of the year, its stillness is broken only by the sound of the fog horn and the pounding surf, but constant alertness on duty, hobbies and music make it a complete and pleasant existence."

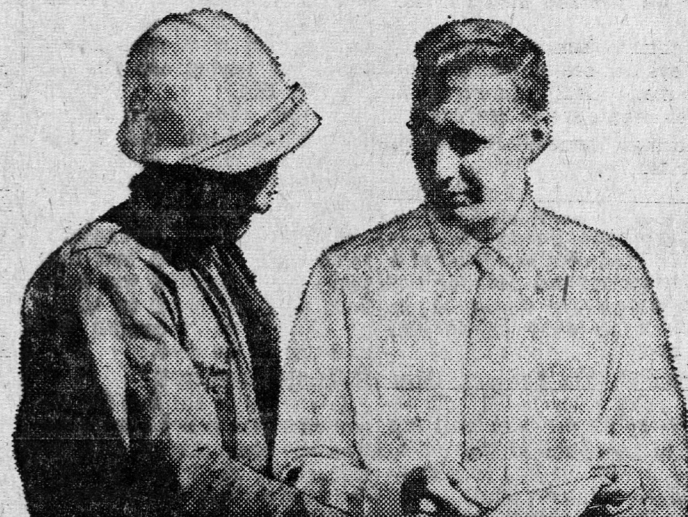
