

Giles Or Frick Seen Possible Commissioner

CHICAGO, Sept. 18 (AP)—Major league baseball owners start assembling here tomorrow in the hope of electing a new commissioner with the names of Warren Giles and Ford Frick heard most prominently.

Thursday's formal meeting is the first legally empowered to replace A. B. (Happy) Chandler in the \$65,000 job, the two previous sessions in New York have been designed merely to cut down the field.

Numerous ballots were taken at these meetings but nine was the most votes anyone received as against 12 needed to elect. Giles was the man who got nine.

The five major names left on the list are Giles, president of Cincinnati Reds; Frick, president of the National League; Milton Eisenhower, president of Penn State College; James A. Farley, chairman of the board of Coca Cola Export; and Governor Frank Lausche of Ohio. Lausche, however, withdrew in a public statement Saturday.

One well placed baseball source said that it looks like a deadlock

between Frick and Giles.

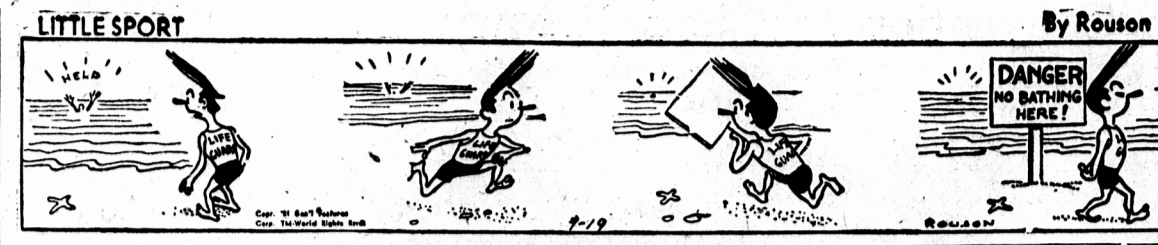
If a deadlock develops baseball may turn to a darkhorse candidate. One possibility baseball men have discussed is former Senator James Mead, now chairman of the Federal Trade Commission. Another is Ben Reese, who retired as managing editor of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

The sentiment for Giles and Frick comes from the baseball owners who feel that the game needs a man who knows its inside workings rather than a famous national figure who might take months to learn the intricacies of the league.

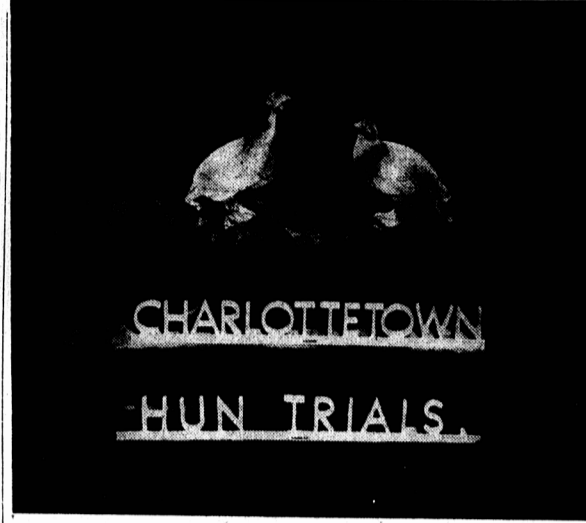
One such owner is P. K. Wrigley of the Chicago Cubs, who declines to reveal his choice but said "Mr. Giles is a very good baseball man."

In previous balloting, said another person in a position to know, Farley received eight votes, Lausche never more than six, and Gen. Rosie O'Donnell seven.

Of the two baseball men still considered leading the list, Frick is the best known. A former newspaper man, Frick became president of the National League in 1934 — youngest ever to hold the job.

Red Wings Confident This Season

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Sept. 18 (CP)—In a display of unusual confidence, the general manager and coach of Detroit Red Wings intimated today that the team is almost sure to finish first in the National Hockey League this season.

"We have more fire and dash than at any other time in the past seven or eight years," said General Manager Jack Adams as he reviewed the first 10 days of the Detroit training camp here.

"These youngsters and the spirit of the veterans have provided just the right combination to make this year's Detroit Red Wings a very dangerous threat for another N.H.L. title."

Coach Tommy Ivan was even more certain.

"I've never seen such a hungry bunch of players," he said. "The way things are going now we should take over first place by a comfortable margin."

Says Case Of Bonhomme, Gray Far From Settled

The case of whom Connie Bonhomme and Bob Gray will play for this season has not been closed by any means, stated Dr. F. C. Dougan, President of the Islanders Hockey Club last night, when asked to comment upon a statement from Glace Bay that the players at Glace Bay property and as far as the Miners are concerned the case is closed.

In the first place Dr. Dougan said there is no such club as Glace Bay Miners. They are a defunct organization and have been replaced by the Glace Bay Community Club. This club was admitted to the Maritime Major Hockey League on September 9 through the good graces of the other hockey centres. They are a separate body who have absolutely nothing to do with the hockey players and it is not even a sports gesture for them to try to hold the players.

As far as Glace Bay is concerned there would be no league because they said earlier in the summer that they would not join any major hockey league the same as North Sydney and New Glasgow.

Uniform Rules For Golfers

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, Sept. 18 (AP)—Uniform rules for golfers throughout the world became a fact tonight when the Royal and Ancient Golf Club adopted in full the new international code for the game drafted here last May.

The United States Golf Association previously had approved the standardized code, which, among other things, abolishes the stymie.

Henceforth when a player believes an opponent's ball to be in the line of his putt he may request that it be marked and lifted.

The new code also will permit use of the slightly smaller British ball in international competitions in the United States.

Indians Get Back In Pennant Race With 6-4 Win Over Red Sox

CHICAGO, Sept. 18 (AP)—White Sox trounced New York Yankees 7-1 Tuesday night while Cleveland Indians got back into the fight for the American League pennant by downing Boston Red Sox 6-4.

That left the Bombers in front of the Indians by a scant three percentage points. The Red Sox are 2 1-2 games back of the Indians.

The Yankees have 11 games to play, Cleveland seven.

The White Sox shelled Vic Raschi with a savage six-run outburst in the eighth inning. Four Chicago hits, two walks and a pair of Yankee errors featured the six-run rally that snapped a 1-1 deadlock.

Billy Pierce, young southpaw throttled the Yankees with eight hits for his 14th victory against as many defeats. Raschi, seeking to become a 20-game winner, instead was socked with his 10th loss.

A four-run spurge in the sixth inning sped the Indians to their important victory in a day game.

Mike "Big Bear" Garcia, weathered a stormy ninth inning as he went all the way to gain his 20th victory before 20,824 Boston fans.

Clergymen Side With Hap Emms In Hockey Battle

TORONTO, Sept. 18 (CP)—The United Church Ministerial Association of Toronto has sided with coach Hap Emms of the Memorial Cup-winning Barrie Flyers in his undeclared war with Connie Smythe of the Stanley Cup-winning Toronto Maple Leafs over Sunday hockey.

Rev. I. G. Perkins, association president, said today that he sent a telegram to Emms yesterday praising his stand.

The telegram read:

"On behalf of over 300 United Church ministers of Toronto, the executive extends to you sincere congratulations, appreciation and support for your stand against compulsory Sunday sport."

"We are proud of you and the Flyers, not Connie Smythe."

The feud began with Emms' refusal to have his Flyers play Sunday games in the Ontario Hockey Association Junior A League in Smythe's Maple Leaf Gardens.

Smythe then warned that his team would apply the National Hockey League rule preventing other professional teams from sponsoring an amateur club within 50 miles of Toronto.

Emms announced he would transfer his club to Stratford, which, unlike Barrie, is beyond the 50-mile radius, providing Boston Bruins continued their sponsorship.

When he learned yesterday, however, that Art Ross, president of the Bruins, had said that his club would be unable to continue sponsoring the Flyers, Emms said the Flyers would remain in the Junior League.

Near Riot At Camera Fight

VIENNA, Sept. 18 (AP)—Riot squads of Vienna police were called tonight to quell an angry chair-throwing crowd of 8,000 wrestling fans disappointed in an exhibition starring Prima Carnera.

The irate crowd, shouting they had been cheated, broke up seats and tore down wooden fences of the outdoor stadium after Carnera's Vienna-born opponent was disqualified.

When riot squads were unable to quiet enraged spectators police cleared them from the stadium and broke up the evening's show.

Famed Captain In Trouble Again

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Sept. 18 (CP)—Famed Captain Dod Osborne is still in trouble. This time, he says, he was accused of being a gunrunner.

The British shipper who jumped into the headlines in 1936 aboard the Grimsby trawler Girl Pat brought the American-registered 80-foot ketch Argosy into port several days ago.

He tied up at a dock in the American lend-lease area and said he was on a Darwinian expedition to South America.

Robert Hale, American consul general, called to pay his respects. Then, as Osborne tells it, he showed Mr. Hale some chemical guns and ammunition he was carrying for American firms for testing purposes. In fact, he says, he loaned Mr. Hale a rifle and ammunition.

The next day, Osborne said, Mr. Hale returned with an armed guard and subjected the ship and crew to a thorough search, tearing up the floorboards and breaking into sealed containers.

Osborne, who says he figures it was all because he was suspected of gunrunning to Venezuela, received his "rifle and apologies."

Osborne was news in 1936 when he disappeared with the Girl Pat and was finally arrested in British Guiana waters after dodging searchers across the Atlantic.

Savoie-Cantor To Meet Sept. 24 In Title Bout

QUEBEC, Sept. 18 (CP)—The Canadian Boxing Federation has sanctioned a 12-round match in Montreal Sept. 24 between Armand Savoie of Montreal and Solly Cantor of Toronto for the Canadian lightweight championship. It was announced today.

Weight of the fighters was fixed at 135 pounds.

The lightweight title has been vacant since the Federation took it away from Arthur King of Toronto two years ago for ignoring a Federation order to defend it.

Wilfrid Samson of Quebec, Federation president, said today King cannot be located.

The Federation's sanction of next Monday's bout stipulates that the winner must defend his title within 30 days against a contender chosen by the Federation.

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Field For Little Brown Jug Narrowed To 13

DELAWARE, O., Sept. 18 (AP)—The field for the "Little Brown Jug" pace for three-year-olds at the Delaware County fair Thursday narrowed today.

Track observers said it "looks like a field of 13" may go in the \$65,000 Ohio harness classic—but the number of starters will not be certain until tomorrow.

Tomorrow, owners must "declare in"—put up their \$500 entrance fee.

Three of the favorites in the race are Tar Heel, owned by the W. N. Reynolds estate, of Winston-Salem, N.C.; Solicitor, also owned by the Reynolds estate, and Direct Rhythm, owned by W. G. Reynolds of Louisville, Ky.

Del Miller, who won last year with Dudley Hanover, may drive Solicitor.

Ambrose Hanover, owned by the J. and M. Stables of Washington Court House, may plan an "iron man" role in the classic. The horse goes to the post Wednesday in the \$2,500 Alma Hurst pace, and the colt's owner and driver, Eddie Havens, says he plans to enter it in Thursday's big event. That's rare in the harness racing world.

H. D. Hanover, who has beaten some of the top entrants in the Little Brown Jug, developed a cough today, and trainer Edgar Leonard said it will not be known until tomorrow whether the horse will enter the race. The horse is owned by E. A. Warren and Son of East Moline, Ill.

Last year's starting field in the classic numbered 16—the largest in the history of the event.
