

# Aces Shade Saints 5-4 In Sudden-Death Overtime

Bookie Garth Harris, who saw little action during the game, took a pass from Ulrich Gallant and blasted a shot past Sheppard in the Saint Dunstan's net after three minutes and 35 seconds of sudden-death overtime play last night to

give the Summerside Aces the deciding goal in one of the most exciting hockey games ever played in Civic Stadium. The final score was 5-4. A crowd of almost 900 fans were kept in a state of frenzied excitement during most of the game.

Coke Grady had scored the tying goal at 19:59 of the final period. A dispute arose as to whether the goal was scored before the end of regulation play, but finally referees, Whalen and Jackson, ruled the goal was legal and ordered the teams into overtime.

### B.Y.C. Will Bear Watching

We doff our cap to Jack Ready, Merrill Pineau and the members of the B.Y.C. who Thursday night at the Sports Arena gave a preview of what we can expect from the youth club in this year's Island Hockey League by belting the strengthened Montague Primroses in no uncertain fashion. To say that we were surprised by the outcome would be putting it very mildly. Before the game after we had a glance at the starting line-ups we gave the B.Y.C. half a chance but figured that the Primroses were carrying too many guns and would eventually sink the youth club ship.

But they were thwarted every time either by poor shooting or by some terrific goalkeeping by Thane Doyle. What Bobby Dowling will have to do to teach his defence to play their positions a little better and not hand B.Y.C. or any other team goals via the breakaway route. If there were any lawyers in the stands Thursday night we feel sure that they would agree that Bobby Dillon had good grounds for a non-support case against his teammates.

Merrill Pineau had a field day at Montague's expense. His 4 goals and 3 assists jumped him to the top of the scoring race. Merrill used his great speed to the best advantage and had no less than four breakaways. And imagine, he picked up those seven points even though he spent 10 minutes of the game in the penalty box and suffered a cut on his forehead in the first period as the result of a high stick. The youth club, thought by many of us to be the league's weakest link, will bear plenty of watching.

These gemlins are at work again. The mischievous little fellows got us in bad with fans of the Parkdale Flyers by carrying a line of type from their proper place in Tuesday's "Corner" and depositing it where it should not be. It was there they shifted a line reading in part "against the Flyers next to another which read not only were we" so the thing read "Not only were we against the Flyers..." To put everyone's mind at ease we really aren't against anybody. We play no favorites whatever in the Island League. Our one great hope is that the league will be nothing better than to see all teams tied for first at the end of the year. Such a situation would pose a few problems but it would be most healthy.

One of the problems we had facing us in the matter of standings by percentages has been solved. There will be no games. All games will be played to a finish so declares league president Cleaver MacLean. A 10-minute overtime period will be played if teams are tied after that it is sudden death.

How wrong can you be? The Primroses seemed more surprised than anybody else at the turn of events. Especially in the early minutes of the first period when they recovered. They were behind 3-0. Ready, as he said he would, has a hunting, spirited hockey club and even though they will get beaten we dare say that they will prove to be one of the most popular teams in the league with the fans because of their wide open style of play. Maybe "wide open" is not quite the correct term to use to describe their style because such a term implies that they stress offence rather than defence and such is not the case, but definitely. We can't remember that last game in this league when a team managed to score only one goal.

In the third period we thought Montague should have had a couple of goals at least. But the boys seemed to be suffering from an extreme case of the hitters and muffed the good chances they had. Even such renowned snipers as Billy Hughes, Apps Arsenault and coach Dowling himself were shooting wide when in close and Billy actually pushed the puck a little too hard and couldn't catch up to it in time to get a shot away. The youth club can't expect cooperation like this in future games because the Primroses won't be taken by surprise.

The score, by the way, wasn't really any indication of the play and even though B.Y.C. established Montague in the final period the Primroses had the edge in play.

Stevenson who gave a financial statement, showing the amounts paid in and dispersed for the last several years and the nice balance that remained. Dr. Searman, president of the association, suggested that in view of this financial standing the percentage deducted from the purses for next year be one per cent instead of two per cent and this was heartily concurred in by the meeting.

It was hoped that the French trotting mare Gelinotte 2:03 1/5 that won her three Italian starts this season would be racing in the United States this fall, but she met with an accident and had to be blistered and laid up. Her trainer, Charlie Mills, hopes to have her all right again for the rich trotting stake Prix de Amerique which will be held in Vincennes in January. Charlie Mills must be getting quite along in years. The writer and the late W. Chester S. McLure attended the harness race meeting near Berlin, Germany, in 1929 and we saw Charlie win several races that day. Their starting system was different from ours and a horse had to be trained to strike the trot easily from a walk-off start.

W.C. House, Medina, Ohio, must have been gratified when he learned that the 3-year-old Gilly Medina bred by him had won her race at the Amager track near Copenhagen, Denmark. She is by Chesapeake 4, 2:09 1/4, a Hambletonian stake winner. ## Saints Hoopsters Tangle With St. Mary's University Tonight

St Dunstan's University basketball team will be making its first home stand of the season tonight when they play St. Mary's University of Halifax in an exhibition tilt at S.D.U. Gym. Saints officially got the season underway last weekend when they travelled to Halifax where they dropped their opening game of the year to St. Mary's but bounced back the next day to knock off Nova Scotia Tech.

This year besides stressing height and quality S.D.U. will endeavour to carry 10 men on its roster a departure from other years when only seven or eight would travel with the team. However Father Walter MacGuigan has decided that at least 10 will be necessary for intercollegiate competition so that plenty of subs will be available in case some of the startin players take an early

leave from the game because of penalties.

This year's version of the Saints will also be one of the tallest teams in history of the University. The five starters will average over 6 feet with newcomer Loren MacGuigan the tallest at 6 feet 3 inches and Chick Morrison the shortest at 5 feet 11 inches. Tallest man on the squad is freshman Gerald Tinley at 6 feet 4 1/2 inches.

New faces on the intercollegiate team will be John (Honolo) Kelly, a scoring whiz from Bear River, P.E.I., Loren MacGuigan of Charlottetown another lad who will get plenty points and is quite sound defensively. Brian Noonan from Regina, Saskatchewan, Dave Betz from Michigan and Gerald Tinley from Campbellton, N. B. The Saints will begin intercollegiate competition against U.N.B. and Mount Allison after Christmas.

# Coaches Hope For Better Pickings In College Draft

By AL VICKERY Canadian Press Staff Writer WINNIPEG (CP) — Coaches in the Big Four and Western Interprovincial Football Unions hope for better pickings when the Canadian College draft comes up in January.

Only a handful of last season's 34 draft choices remained in the big time. Team officials are hoping for a better percentage of successful candidates for next year. Officials of the Canadian Football Council are considering taking steps to eliminate any situation in which a college player is not placed on the draft list and is signed by a pro club. It happened twice on the 1956 draft.

Halfback Ron Stewart an all-star from Queen's University at Kingston Ont., was not named to the list by Queen's officials because he said he would return to college this fall to continue studies. Stewart played with Queen's this season and Montreal Alouettes in the big four put him on their negotiation list. This means he will not show on the 1957 draft.

PREVENT RECURRENCES Another case was that of Gary Schrader, a half at Queen's who went with the Big Four Ottawa Rough Riders this season. Schrader returned to Queen's last summer to write supplemental examinations. He then signed with Ottawa and was outstanding during the 1956 season. Riders presumably have him either signed or under option for next year.

When the next draft choices are made there is expected to be plenty of hollering from other clubs in the two leagues to prevent such moves. The national draft system was instituted last January at the annual meeting of the Canadian Rugby Union at Winnipeg.

The draft was started with the idea of cutting down expensive bidding for players and also to give the lower place teams a chance to strengthen by having the first choices.

Last year only one college graduate finished the season with a Western Interprovincial Football Union club. Fullback Phil Munz from the University of Toronto was first choice of the bottom-place Calgary Stampeders.

DEALS UNDER WAY College grads to stick in the east included Toronto Argonaut tackle Gerry O'Flanagan from the University of British Columbia and Ottawa ends Lou Bruce from Queen's and Fred Smale from Toronto.

This year, deals already are being made by teams for the 1957 draft. Argonauts relinquished their first draft choice to British Co-

lumbia Lions to get quarterback Arnold Galiffe as a replacement for injured Tom Dubinski during the 1956 schedule. Calgary did the same to obtain halfback Ron Clincksale from Lions. The draft list takes in players in the graduating year at the University of Toronto University of Western Ontario Queen's McGill, University of Montreal, McMaster at Hamilton, Ont., and the University of British Columbia. Priority of selection is the reverse order of the championship standing in each union after union playoffs at the close of the previous season. The team at the bottom of the union whose representative was the loser in the Grey Cup gets the first choice. The bottom place team of the other league gets second choice, and so on. The teams continue in that order until all the players are selected or until all clubs pass on any remaining players.
