## CONTRACT BRIDGE

West dealer. East-West vulnerable.

**NORTH**  
♠ A84  
♥ K10886  
♦ J8  
♣ A85

**EAST**  
♠ J1092  
♥ Q42

♣ 763

**SOUTH**  
♠ KQ765  
♥ A-J  
♦ 742

The bidding:  
West North East South  
1♣ 1♥ Pass 1♠  
Pass 2♣ Pass 4♠

Opening lead—king of diamonds.

It is rare for declarer to deliberately lose control of trumps, but that there are hands where this course is advisable is shown by today's deal.

West cashed the A-K of diamonds and continued with the queen. Dummy ruffed, East following to the diamond. The contract now seemed sure to make, assuming the spades broke 3-2, since declarer intended to draw three rounds of trumps, lead the A-J of hearts and finesse, not caring too much whether the finesse worked or not.

But when South played the A-K of spades, West showed out, and a new complexion came upon the matter. The contract was now in danger.

The location of the queen of hearts, only of academic interest before, now became of crucial importance. If the heart suit could be brought in, the contract might yet be made. The question was how to establish the suit.

Declarer decided to give up on the finesse idea. He elected to play for a 3-3 split, with the additional possibility that either opponent might have been dealt Q-x of hearts. He played the ace of hearts and the jack of the king.

When he led another heart from dummy, East's heart appeared. South ruffed.

The contract was now home. It was obvious from East's early plays of the 10-9-5 that East had no more diamonds. But to make the hand South had to do an unusual thing. He had to denude himself of trumps.

Dummy, at this point, had two good hearts and the A-8-5 of clubs. South had two spades and the Q-10-9 of clubs.

Declarer led the queen and another spade, discarding two clubs from dummy. East had to return a club and dummy was high.

But if South had not extracted both trumps, he would have gone down. Thus, if he had first played a club to the ace in order to lead hearts, East would have trumped the first heart lead and the defenders would have nabbed both a trump trick and a club to inflict a one-trick set.

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## Anniversary Recalls East German Revolt

**BERLIN (AP)**—Six years ago Wednesday, East Germany's workers electrified the world by revolting against their Russian-backed Communist government.

Up until then it had been a fairly peaceful summer. In Russia Stalin was dead and many hoped a better life might be coming.

This was especially true of the workers on an East Berlin street known as Stalin Lee. On June 16

they started something that was to inspire workers in Poznan and Budapest three years later—they marched in protest against higher work norms.

They marched peacefully. Yet it was an incredible sight in a Communist country. The very idea of a protest march was so unusual that Westerners at first thought it had been planned by the Communists as a safety valve.

**MARCHED IN RAIN**

But early in the morning of June 17, 1953, the world knew the workers weren't organized by anyone except themselves. Thousands refused to enter their factories and railway shops. They formed long columns and marched through a pouring rain to government headquarters.

The Russians rushed in with armored cars and tanks. Shots were fired and the fighting was on. Most of the workers had nothing but sticks and stones.

The news spread quickly to other Eastern German cities—Dresden, Leipzig, Rostock, Chemnitz, Magdeburg—and the fighting was on there too.

But the tanks and the machine-guns were too much. In a couple of days the resistance had been broken.

The East German government admitted 25 persons had been killed. But West German newspapers estimated the number of dead at somewhere above 500. The number of injured was said to be about 1,700.

This was six years ago. Could something like it happen again in East Germany?

Most experts think not. Six years—and the fate of the Polish and Hungarian upheavals—have left their mark on the East Germans.

The East German government has become stronger. The Communists have organized strong-arm squads in factories.

Rising standards have slowly risen, and food rationing was abolished last year.
