Wearing sprigs of heather sent from Scotland for the occasion by Miss Harriet Donaldson of Edinburgh, the guests gathered around the banquet tables at Mulberry Lodge to pipe music by Pipe Major Sandy MacQueen, who later "piped in" the haggis, carried high by John Mungall in the manner pictured by the famous words of Scotland's beloved poet Robert Burns, whose poem on this subject was voiced again in the address to the haggis, eloquently made by John Hoykirk.

The main address, outlining the life and legends of Saint Andrew, patron saint of Scotland, was made most interestingly by Charles Craig, a native of Scotland until coming to Canada only about five years ago.
