The scholarship provides for \$1,000 in the coming university year, and \$500 in each of the years 1956-56, and 1956-57 provided that a satisfactory standing is maintained in the university work.

Miss Matheson has been accepted as an honors student in history. She has been an outstanding student through her years at Prince of Wales school here. This year she was awarded the Prof. George E. Robinson scholarship, a college prize for coming second in Arts, and the Health Macquarrie prize for topping her class in political science.

Commander Leo B. Warring, a native of Washington, D.C. The Sullivans won nine battle honors during the last war, carrying on the tradition of her namesakes, and is now 21 years old, having received with distinction since her commissioning in San Francisco in September, 1943.

Highlight of the Royal Canadian Navy's visit here in the next few days will be its celebrated and colorful Sunset Ceremony, to be presented on board by officers and men from HMS Cornwallwall, the Navy's basic training establishment near Digby, N.S.

The Sunset Ceremony is being put on in conjunction with the activities marking the 100th anniversary of the Fathers of Confederation on September 1. A guard, two field guns' crews and a 45-piece band perform the elaborate spectacle.

Members of the guard and a gun's crews are young sailors who have completed about three

months training at Cornwallwall. They will be quartered on the mobile repair ship HMCS Cape Scot.

The Sunset Ceremony itself is a composite of customs whose history and traditions are several hundred years old. climax of the ceremony comes with the lowering of the White Ensign to the accompaniment of the orchestrated Sunset Call.

This is a ceremonial version of a daily custom observed in all naval shore establishments and ships in harbor. With it, to form the complete Sunset Ceremony, have been combined the ancient ceremonies of "beating the retreat" and "tattoo."

Chicago Hurler Has Last Laugh

The stocky Puerto Rican with the five fast ball and elusive curve not only has been winning the big ones this year but doing it with such regularity that he may wind up as the winning pitcher in the American League.

More important, he may help pitch the White Sox to the pennant.

Pizarro, who has a record of 17-6, has won his last three decisions. His victims have been New York, twice, and Minnesota, against these two hard-hitting teams, he allowed just three runs in 47 innings.

Against Baltimore's front runner Orioles, he is 2-0. His latest triumph was a 1-0 victory going against the Twins Tuesday night.

Pizarro has been blasted often for losing key games. And more often receives little credit for his victories. One reason is that he is not the greatest when it comes to public relations. He can inspire writers off with short, yes and no answers and let it go that.

"I try my best," said Pizarro. "Sometimes I'm good and I lose and sometimes I'm bad."

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Ships Of 3 NATO Navies To Honor Island With Visit

Seven ships from the navies of three NATO nations are scheduled to arrive in Charlottetown over the weekend to take part in ceremonies evoking around the centennial commemorative meeting of Canadian premiers here next week.

Newest ship and one of the most advanced of its kind in the world is HMCS Yukon, launched in 1961 but not commissioned until last year. Captain of this sleek, fast ship, which specializes in anti-submarine hunter-killer work, is Commander R. W.J. Cocks, CD, a native of Victoria, B.C. Yukon is a MacKenzie Class DE.

The United States Navy ship USS The Sullivans was named after the fighting Sullivans, five brothers who served in the USN during the last war and died together on the same ship. It was sunk by the enemy.

The Sullivans was commissioned in 1945 and saw extensive action in the Pacific during World War II, earning nine battle stars. It serves now, one of the oldest and proudest ships in the American Navy, as a navy reserve training unit. Cmdr. Leo B. Warring is her captain.

The French Navy frigate completes the list of visiting navies. Commandant Bourdais is explained by Capitaine de Frigate Louis Guillon, and serves as parent ship and escort for the French fishing fleet operating off the Grand Banks.

Most varied history of all is the Canadian ship HMCS Cape Scot, which was built in Canada for the Royal Navy, serving the last years of the war, was subsequently loaned to the Dutch Navy, and finally returned to Canada for re-commissioning in 1963. This mobile repair ship, also known as a "mother ship" is captained by Cmdr.
