Anniversary To Be Observed By Presbyterian Church

This coming Sunday, the congregation of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Montague, will observe the 37th Anniversary of the dedication of their present building, at a special service at 7.30 p.m.

Presbyterian influences in the area date back as far as 1779, when Scottish families settled in Three Rivers in Kings County. The records show that in 1783, Dr. James MacGregor of Picou visited and preached at frequent intervals until 1821. The first evidence of an established Presbyterian congregation is in 1843, when, at a public meeting held in the school at Montague, the Three Rivers and Murray Harbor congregations issued a call to Rev. Hugh Ross. But the first minister to preach regularly in Montague was Rev. Peter Melville, who held services in the Temperance Hall as early as 1876. The first Presbyterian Church was begun in 1874, and dedicated in 1876. This building of a houses the congregation of Trinity United Church.

In 1927, the Presbyterian congregation took over the old Methodist Church, moved it back from the street, carried out extensive renovations, and dedicated it as St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in the fall of the same year.

Additional renovations have been made over the past 13 years. A church hall was added, the church sanctuary was remodelled and redecorated, and this spring and summer changes were made to the increased space for the Sunday School.

Stil Possession Brings Remand

The trial by summary conviction of James Wendell Myers began last night at a special sitting of magistrate's court, with James B. Johnston, Q.C., presiding. Myers is charged with the possession of a still suitable for the manufacture of spirits, without having a license to own one and without giving notice of having possession thereof. The accused was not in court at the time the hearing started, and the magistrate decided the hearing should proceed with defense counsel Gordon Tweedy acting for the accused. Representing the Liquor Control Commission, which prosecutes the case under the Liquor Control Act of this province, was Ian M. MacLeod. The only testimony given was that of the investigating and arresting officer, Cpl. William Wilson of the Charlottetown RCMP. Cpl. Wilson testified that he had found a still in some woods in the district of Mermaid where the accused resides. Entered as exhibits were eight pieces of equipment from the still and a certificate of analysis from the Excise Department laboratories in Ottawa, certifying the ethyl alcohol content of a sample of liquid taken from the still. Charges in the case were laid on July 22. Myers was remanded by consent of defense counsel to Sept. 30, with bail to stand, after Mr. Tweedy objected to certain testimony of the witness as being prejudicial to the accused. The magistrate agreed.

Maritime Christian College To Hold Fall Convocation

Glenn B. Watterson, A.B., B.D., will be the main speaker at the fall Convocation of Maritime Christian College, here in Charlottetown, on Wednesday evening, Sept. 16. The service will be held in the Central Christian Church and will be conducted by Mr. Merle Zimmerman, chairman of the college board.

Mr. Watterson is joining the faculty of the college as Registrar and Professor of Christian Ministries. He received his degrees at Minnesota Bible College in Minneapolis, and Christian Theological Seminary in Lansing, Mich. for 12 years, he served one year with the Toronto Christian Seminary.

With his wife he is now moving to Charlottetown where he will work with the Maritime Christian College.

Classes at the college will be held today morning in the afternoon. Mr. Morris, president of MCC, will be conducting a class which will be of interest to all. It will be a study of Genesis and the other historical portions of the Old Testament, with special consideration of the critical attacks on this part of the Bible. It will contribute to the defense of the historical integrity of the Scriptures. All classes at the college are open to the public.

Morell To Install Sewage Disposal

MORELL.—Ratepayers at Morell have decided to install a sewage disposal system in the village. A representative of W. R. Crandall Associates of Moncton, N.B. met with citizens recently to discuss what was involved in such a project. Village commissioners, headed by Aldus MacKenzie, will work with the firm to conduct a thorough investigation into the matter. Tenders will be called, and work is expected to begin in early spring. The commissioners were also instructed to bring in a firm price and plans for a new sewage disposal system.

The building is to house two first, trucks and provide accommodation for the public library. The commissioners will call a ratepayers meeting when they obtain a firm price. The library has been located in the elementary school for the past few years, but because of the large school enrolment this year, the space was inadequate for a classroom. The building was needed for doing work in education. This represents an increase of more than 50 per cent over last year's registration in this facility, said Gordon Bennett, registrar.

The Dean of Women, Mrs. R. Hurst, has reported that the Montgomery Hall residence is filled. The residence accommodates 104 students. Many female students, unable to obtain accommodation at Montgomery Hall are being housed in private homes in Charlottetown. The high school registration, as previously announced, is slightly in excess of 500 students.

Trade, Industry Council Meeting Set For Dalvay

Between 40 and 45 delegates are expected to attend the 13th annual meeting of the provincial industry council at Dalvay, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. The meeting will be held at the Dalvay Hotel. The program for the meeting will be: V. M. Knight, deputy minister of trade and industry, will preside at the opening of the meeting. Among the topics scheduled for discussion are: a) a program for upgrading adult skills, trade fairs and trade missions; b) the functions and operations of the department of industry in the provinces. A dinner sponsored by the government of Prince Edward Island has been scheduled for Thursday evening.

A regional conference of the Civil Service Federation of Canada is scheduled for Sept. 18 and 19 in Charlottetown. Sponsored by the P.E.I. district council, the conference will bring together representatives from the four Atlantic provinces.

Principal topics on the agenda will include the Canada pension plan, collective bargaining in the public service, and grievance and appeal procedures. Special speakers and discussors will include C. A. Edwards, CSP president; John MacGuire, research director; Charles Constantine, secretary of the National Defence Employees Association, and J. Donald (Connie) Constantine, secretary of Direct Affiliates and Organization.
