ST. GEORGE'S DAY—To-day.

By a return laid on the table of the House of Commons, Ottawa, it is shown that the number of 1812-13 veterans, who received pensions in 1875 is 1881, and the amount paid was \$36,200. The number of officers is 21.
 MARCELLUS JERNON, of St. Louis, Kent Co., N. B., died recently in his 99th year. The deceased lived to see the fourth generation—children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren and their children, numbering in all two hundred and fifty.

LORD DERBY, replying to an invitation to attend a meeting of the Lancashire Conservative Associations, of which he has heretofore been president, writes:—"I cannot longer act as a member of that body, and have to request the withdrawal of my name from it."

AT Montreal, on the 19th, Caroline Manyorgan, a child suffering from typhoid fever, died from the effects of a mistake of an assistant (named Peppin) of Mr. Golden, druggist, who dispensed per-chloride instead of sub-chloride of mercury.

A LARGE EAGLE.—A gray eagle, of an enormous size, was seen last week by a farmer at Mount Uniacke, N. S. When first seen it was sitting on a fence, and was taken by the farmer to be a man trespassing on his grounds, but on his approach it started up and rapidly flew away. It is said that an eagle of such large dimensions is seldom seen in Nova Scotia.

THE Governor General has received a letter from a number of former tenants of the Duke of Argyll, in Scotland, who have emigrated to the state of Illinois, congratulating His Excellency on his appointment in Canada, and inviting him to visit their settlement. Lord Lorne has replied that his duties here will prevent him from complying with their request at an early day.

THE barquentine "Adeline," from Cardiff, March 24th, for Sagua, was abandoned at sea. She was a vessel of 298 tons, built in P. E. Island in 1876, hailed from Port Hawkesbury, and was owned by Capt. Angus Grant, of Port Hawkesbury. She was insured in the Ocean and Merchants' Marine Insurance offices of Halifax—\$5,000 in each.

A PLETHORA OF MONEY.—The London Times' financial article, commenting on bank returns, which show a reserve fund of £9,000,000 higher than in the corresponding period of 1877, says money is gathering more into a stagnant mass in the London market, and exists now in such amounts that were people's mind at ease, gigantic schemes and speculations would spring into being.

PIANO TUNING.—On account of the severe and prolonged depression in every branch of business here, we regret to learn that Mr. J. A. Smithson intends leaving here after the opening of navigation. We exceedingly regret losing Mr. Smithson, as he always has ranked high in his profession; and we, at the same time, miss a good citizen and a genial friend. We understand that he intends locating in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, there being a vacancy there at present.—Toronto Telegraph.

We understand the honorable the Minister of Customs has decided that egg boxes imported from the United States to be filled with eggs and exported, may be returned to Canada to be refilled without requiring duty a second time. The duty must be collected on first importation; and the boxes are to be stamped upon a square of paper pasted on the inside of each box. Without such an identifying mark, the boxes will, we believe, on each time of importation, be charged with duty. The Collector here is making such arrangements as will carry out the Minister's orders and facilitate trade, and, no doubt, he will communicate with the outport Collectors. Country shippers should know this, and govern themselves accordingly.

AMERICAN MULES FOR SOUTH AFRICA.—Over 300 of the 400 mules purchased in Kentucky by agents of the British Government for the troops engaged in the Zulu war arrived at New York last week, and were shipped on board the Dominion Line steamer "Ontario." The steamer will take 500 mules altogether. The average cost of the mules is \$160. American mules have been found superior to those of Spain or South America, and were for that reason preferred. A large consignment is being collected in Buenos Ayres, however, for the same purpose. The "Ontario," after sailing from New York, does not expect to stop at any point before reaching Cape Town. South Africa, where she will take in coal and provisions. It is expected to reach Cape Town in the latter part of May, and Port Natal about the 1st of June.

The London and Paris papers have recently been discussing from rival standpoints the relative wealth of France and Great Britain, but so far with very little evidence of satisfaction to either. The London papers claim that the estimates put upon English wealth by the Frenchmen are grossly inaccurate, and dissent entirely from the results reached. The French figures place the value of the private property of Great Britain at \$40,000,000,000, and that of France at \$43,110,600,000, which, added to the property of each, gives as a total for France \$46,110,600,000, and to Great Britain \$42,500,000,000—thus making France the richer country. Whether correct or not, it is certain that the annual increase of French wealth for the last ten years is \$750,000,000. Yet, France is another "Protection ruined" country.

A GRAVE accident happened at Etchemini, Que., on the 19th. A canoe which left Quebec at 3.30, with provisions and eight men, upset, and only two were saved—P. Garont and Joseph Cote. The names of the missing men are Edw. Gaguon, Amb. Jocas, F. Valier, M. Rousseau (flour merchant), Lynch Hethrington and Jos. T. Foucher, jr. One of the survivors is not expected to live. They are all of the same parish. By a good chance a canoe was sent from the other side, although it arrived too late to save them all. Those missing were all laborers except Rousseau, who was a flour merchant established there lately.

A FEW days ago a man named Kemp, of Belleville, Ont., who was in company with one John Bouter, showed some money, which excited Bouter's cupidity. The latter enticed Kemp to a lonely place, where he demanded Kemp's money. He refused, and Bouter beat him severely with a stick; but repenting, took his victim to a creek, washed his wounds, and made him swear he would not disclose the name of his assailant, but report that another man committed the assault. Kemp was taken home, and is still confined to bed, from the effects of his injuries. Bouter, who escaped, has since been captured and been committed to jail for trial.

It is thought that a vast emigration from England will shortly commence from town and country. The conviction that England's manufacturing supremacy will never be re-established, and that manufacturing employment in England will henceforth be both scanty and ill-paid is reported to be spreading among British artisans. Then, the English farming class has, by one means or another, been brought into great straits. Crops have more or less failed for several years. Prices of farm produce are low. Rents and taxes are high. Under these circumstances numbers of both classes will seek relief in emigration. It is to be hoped that Canada will largely profit thereby as well as other British Colonies.—News.

St. Thomas, March 29.—Sailed brig. Marshal S., Mann, Cienfuegos.

The schr. Enterprise sailed from Crapaud, P. E. I., last December, with a cargo of produce for Halifax. She was driven into M. R. e Joseph by stress of weather, and was frozen in there until about the 17th of March, when she sailed for Halifax. Experienced heavy weather and lost flying jib, and after putting into several harbors were driven into Clam Bay, and sailed from there on Friday last. That night, while off Sheatland Island in a heavy snow storm, the vessel was run into by a topsail schooner, the name of which could not be made out. The Enterprise was so badly damaged that it was impossible to keep her afloat, and the captain and crew left in a boat, only saving part of their clothing. Shortly afterwards the vessel sunk.
