U.S. Steel Hits High For Year

CLEVELAND (AP)—Steel production last week hit its highest point of the year—75.5 per cent of rated capacity—and should equal that this week, Steel Magazine reports today. Operations were up one point from the previous week and the metal-working weekly estimated production at 2,038,000 net tons of steel. Ten of the 12 steelmaking districts reported higher rates of operations at the same levels. A survey by the magazine shows that one-third of U.S. metal-working plants will expand in 1959. Of those, 10 per cent will build new plants; 35 per cent will make additions; and 70 per cent will buy new equipment. "In all, plant operation capacity will be hiked 2.6 per cent," the publication predicts. "Metal-working management has taken a look at long-range prospects and the future appears to be so good they want to get ready." The weekly's composite on the prime grade of steel making scrap dropped again for the fourth straight week. It was down 50 cents to \$39.17 a gross ton. Steel said scrap sales are off 50 per cent for the first eight months of 1958 compared with a year ago and consumption is off 39 per cent for nine months as against last year. Inventories, however, are 25 per cent above year ago levels as of Oct. 31.

TIMELY NOTES ON FUR TOPICS

These lines are being written on December 10, and that date brings back to mind the days when Prince Edward Island silver fox was held in the highest esteem, and a lady having possession of a good silver fox neckpiece and muff attracted tremendous attention. \$1,000 A PAIR
It was on this date (December 10) 1952 that Arthur Henderson of this province, and myself, placed fifty pairs of silver foxes in a new ranch owned by the Chicago Silver-Black Fox Company, 19 miles from Chicago. I had received a letter from the president of the company, who was also the head of the American Steel and Wire Co., Chicago in June of that year asking for information on silver fox prices. I took a train to Chicago, met the company directors, and sold their 50 pairs for \$50,000 to be delivered at their nearest station to the ranch early in December, duty and freight paid. Accompanied by Arthur Henderson, we left Charlottetown on December 8. We were held up at Detroit to pay \$7,500 in duty. When we arrived at the station nearest the ranch it was early in the morning of December 10; our connection to that point was made by a little train that served some smaller places outside Chicago. It was a tremendous job lugging the 50 pairs of foxes in the heavy boxes and placing them in the 50 pens, which were 25 feet by 40 feet—much larger than our pens. The temperature registered 10 above zero and the wind was quite brisk. When we got through, we were very, very tired.

I caught a train back to Chicago, and the next morning was on my way home, stopping off at Detroit to cash a cheque. I was told to be very careful, as there were gunmen in the vicinity. The above story is just one of hundreds connected with our silver fox industry, which was then spreading throughout the United States and Canada. We little thought that another 25 years would see its collapse.

BLUE FOX
Here is a good indication that long-haired furs are coming back. Oslo, Norway, December 7— "Norwegian blue fox was 100 per cent sold with a total average price of \$31 at the Oslo Fur Auction Company sale on December 7."

"Ordinary quality fox averaged \$27. Saga averaged \$34 with a top price of \$48. The United States was the main buyer."

And here is good news for our mink ranchers. Montreal, December 7— "Advances ranging between 25 and 40 percent were registered in standard dark and pastels at the special mink sale of the Canadian Fur Auction Sales Company (Quebec) Ltd. in Montreal.

"There was a decline, however in other mutations. Some Sapphire and Silver Blue were ten percent off; whites fifteen percent off. Desert Gold, on the other hand, registered a ten percent advance, while Aleutian and Azuren were unchanged. "Clearances were high...with over 95 percent of the 70,000 skins changing hands. Darks and Pastels (with their EMBA counterparts—Majestic Dark and Autumn Haze) each went 100 percent. Sapphire 95 percent, Agents 93 percent, Cerulean went 80 percent and Silver Blue 88 percent.

"Close to 150 buyers crowded the sale room when the first lot came under the hammer, and interest remained lively until nearly midnight when the last low grade strings were sold. New York buyers were strongly represented, and many top lots in mutations went to that city, although Canadians managed to maintain themselves in the face of strong competition."

In far-away Hamburg, Wisconsin, on December 7, Fromm Brothers, the largest breeders of silver fox and mink in the world, held their sale with buyers present from New York, Chicago and other large American cities. Of the 10,000 standard ranch mink offered, almost all were sold at better prices than last December. Top price was \$36 for a lot of 64 males. Females sold from \$10.25 to \$16.25.

U. K. Economy Improves But Exports Declining

EASTBOURNE, Eng. (CP)—Prime Minister Macmillan said Friday night that despite improvements in Britain's economy, exports are falling.

The reason, he told a black-tie dinner winding up a conference of the Dollar Exports Council, is that countries that sell basic commodities to Britain have not been able to earn enough money to buy manufactured goods. In spite of the importance of the dollar trade, the United Kingdom must have a sound economy at home in order to remain competitive in world markets, the prime minister said. Britain's gold and dollar reserves had grown steadily in the last year but "even at present the reinforced levels are certainly not excessive in relation to all the work they have to do."

Much of Britain's economic improvement was derived from the fact in the import bill which had resulted in lower incomes for overseas producers of primary commodities.
