Few Able To Continue from page 1 to the majority of Canadians. Mr. Lesage said it would take a "rather unusual, if not impossible" set of circumstances to bring about the complete tax exemption set out in Mr. Coldwell's example.

Latest Tax Statistics: Latest available tax statistics, he said, showed that the average taxpayer in the \$8,000-\$10,000-a-year income group received dividend income of less than \$400.

George Hees (PC-Toronto Broadview) also urged that steps be taken to make it easier for Canadians to buy their own homes. He described the budget as a "mink coat budget."

In his first major speech since he became Mr. Abbott's assistant a few months ago, Mr. Lesage said the budget is "fair and equitable—the best possible under present circumstances."

He referred to the speech Tuesday by J. M. Macdonnell, chief financial critic for the Progressive Conservative opposition.

Mr. Macdonnell had said that the budget was framed as a "vote catcher" for the mass of the electorate," said Mr. Lesage. In the "same breath" Mr. Macdonnell had said the tax reductions would go only to a small select group.

Continued from page 1: growers. However, he believes that though it is difficult to find an immediate solution to the problem the groundwork has already been laid for a fairer tariff policy and a freight rate basis for the future.

Mr. MacDonald met many members of the potato business during his extended visit and admitted to surprise at their awareness of some weaknesses in the marketing policy used and would welcome any change that would bring a greater degree of stability both to the movement and price position. He added that it was a recognized fact that what has been accomplished so far has been the only stabilizing influence so far this season on the potato markets of Eastern Canada.

He also said that while the present position is not all that is desired the Island growers have moved a higher percentage of last year's crop at a higher price level than any other Province in Canada.
