

Islanders May Have Four New Men Tonight In Game With Millionaires

Murph Chamberlain's Islanders may have four new men in the lineup when they take to the ice tonight against Sydney Millionaires in an M.H.L. game at the Forum.

Newcomers certain to start with the Islanders are defenseman Steve Brklacich and left winger Charlie Holdway. Defenseman Gus Gustavson is here and may be playing while Lyle Wiseman, a right winger from the Quebec Aces is expected to arrive in the City today.

Holdway, a 20 year old left winger, checked in yesterday evening about 6.20 by plane. A six footer with a hard shot he is expected to give the Islanders a lot of scoring power.

Wiseman is a big right winger who was purchased by coach Murph Chamberlain from the Quebec Aces. Last year he played with Shawinigan Falls and the year before he saw service with Indianapolis Capitals of the American Hockey League. He is 23 years old.

Holdway is in his first year outside of junior hockey. Last year with Prince Albert he scored 45 goals in a tough junior league. He comes to the Islanders from the Vancouver Canucks.

Brklacich and Gustavson arrived here Saturday afternoon and played in Glace Bay Saturday night where they impressed fans with a capable, hard hitting style of play.

Gustavson, however tangled with Wild Bill Burega of the Miners and both players drew match penalties.

The action started when Gustavson rode Burega into the boards in the Islanders end and checked the Glace Bay player. Burega hit Gus with his stick and "The Big Swede" retaliated with his fists. Gus downed Burega and according to coach Murph Chamberlain knocked the Miners defenseman as cold as a cucumber. For this both players were given the heave-ho.

Chamberlain charged last night that the sentence dealt out to the Islanders player was very unfair. "I imagine that the referee must have been reading the advance publicity about him or he had orders to crack down on Gus immediately," stated the Hardrock.

A decision may be given on Gustavson today. If such is the case he may be playing tonight.

Left winger Jimmy MacKenzie may return to the Islanders lineup tonight. Chamberlain sat MacKenzie out for the last two games but it looks as though Murph will give Jim a chance to regain his left wing position.

Popular Wimpy Stephenson, who worked his heart out for the Islanders cause this season, has been recalled by Buffalo Bisons

and will be leaving within the next few days. The Millionaires come here tonight in second place, four points ahead of the Islanders. The Mills have been playing top notch hockey of late and until they were defeated by the Halifax Atlantics Saturday night, they had run up a three game winning streak over the Halifax team.

The arrival of Gus Gustavson and Steve Brklacich in the Islanders camp appear to have brought the Islanders' defensive worries to an end. Gustavson and Brklacich from all reports are a rugged duo who will prove worthy successors to Phil Vitale and Johnny Dutchak.

A Charlottetown fan who accompanied the team to Glace Bay reported last night that two players were fast, good puck carriers and excellent blockers. Both weigh more than 200 pounds and both thrive on the rough going.

In speaking of the game coach Murph Chamberlain stated the team was very solid defensively but that the forwards were a bit weak at the Bay. "It was a tough game," stated Murph. "but this time we did the knocking around." Chamberlain disclosed last night that he will have another defenseman in camp sometime this week and that he plans to carry five defensemen throughout the season.

Chamberlain was peeved however at referee Charlie Goodie's decision to hand out a match penalty to Gustavson for his fight with Bill Burega. According to Murph, Burega hit Gustavson from behind with his stick and "The Big Swede" retaliated with his fists. Murph was of the opinion that the referee was out to nail Gustavson on the first opportunity and so he gave the Islanders player the works.

Brklacich also had a run-in with a fan who jumped on the ice during the Ronnie Hurst-Neil Amadio scrap. Hurst was whipping Amadio in the corner when the fans started coming over the boards. Chamberlain himself was on the ice and by the time he reached Hurst, Ronnie was practically out on his feet, having been slugged from behind by some fan. This is not the first time the fans have come over the boards at Glace Bay and this thought prompted Murph to say that the Islanders will beat the Glace Bay team and the fans as well.

Forwards Don Holdway and Lyle Wiseman, who may be in action tonight come here with good scoring records. The 23-year-old Wiseman scored 17 goals with Shawinigan Falls in the Q.S.H.L. last year. The season before he scored 27 with Indianapolis in the American Hockey League. Holdway fired 45 goals with Prince Albert in the Western Junior hockey league last season. According to those who have seen him in action he is quite a good player.

The boys will definitely be playing for their jobs tonight. At this writing the Islanders have five left wingers in the persons of Marcel Clements, Don Bellinger, Charlie Holdway, Bill Hagen and Jim MacKenzie. The latter has missed the last two contests but will likely see action tonight. If Wiseman arrives today the locals will be right wing happy with five right wingers. They are Connie Bonhomme, Gary Gordon, Ren Hurst, Bob Gray and Wiseman.

Buck Whitlock and Hub Beaudry still share the centre-ice duties between them but help should be here before the week is out. Murph has two centre-ice men on the line and hopes to have them here shortly. Back on defense the Islanders have five men and another coming in. When the December 15 deadline is reached the Islanders will be carrying five defensemen, four centres, and six wing men along with goalie Al Millar. Right now only about eight players are sure of remaining here.

Eddie Joss of Shawinigan Falls arrived in Charlottetown Saturday afternoon with Gus Gustavson and Steve Brklacich. Eddy was a centre-man with Shawinigan Falls and was loaned out to Glace Bay at the same time that Brklacich was obtained by the Islanders. However he wanted to come here and he wired for transportation. Not receiving his transportation he came anyway and the Islanders had to return him to Glace Bay Saturday afternoon.

Frankie Roper, good young Charlottetown goalie, suffered a broken knee cap in Saint John Saturday night during the game between the Saint John Beavers and the Fredrickton Caps. Roper stopped a bullet-like shot but despite the padding the knee cap was broken. Brian Lewis of Charlottetown joined the Beavers midway through the first period and picked up a goal and an assist. Brian scored the Beavers' third goal and assisted on the fourth. The sportscaster covering the game had quite a few good words for Brian, who in a year made the jump from junior B to senior hockey.

Three Harness Horses Break Money Records

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 7 (AP)—Three harness horses, led by W. H. Cape's Good Time, broke the single season money-winning record in 1952.

The U.S. Trotting Association said today the Goshen, N.Y. pint-sized pacer brought his owner \$110,299 before his retirement. C.W. Clark's Sharp Note won \$101,623 and Dudley Hanover, property of the Hayes Fair Acres Stable of Duquoin, Ill., chalked up \$87,994 in purses.

The previous record was set by Proximity in 1950 with earnings of \$87,175.

Prince Adios, owned by Grant Hodgins of Clandeboye, Ont., won \$44,451 last season to rank 10th among the top 10 pacer and trotter money earners in 1952, USTA figures show.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7 (AP)—Don Hurst, 47, a former major league first baseman, died Saturday. He had been ill several months. Hurst played with Philadelphia Phils from 1928 to 1934 and with Chicago Cubs in 1934.

GLACE BAY, N. S., Dec. 7 (CP)—Glace Bay Miners rode to a 1-0 victory over Charlottetown Islanders on the strength of D. Keller's early first-period goal in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here Saturday.

Keller teamed up with Johnny Raynak for the marker with the game three minutes and 20 seconds old. From there on it was a goalies' battle in a game which featured close-checking, clean hockey except for two major flareups.

Bill Burega and Gus Gustavson, newcomer to the Charlottetown blue-line staff, started swinging punches with a minute remaining in the first period. The tussle saw both of them banned for the rest of the contest.

Neil Amadio and Ron Hurst had a strong difference of opinion near the end of the final frame, and both drew majors.

Other penalties went to George McLagan and Lloyd Hinchberger in the first period and Marce Clements in the third.

The visitors outshot Miners except in the last period, and Don Lockhart had to turn aside 36 scoring tries for his shutout. Al Millar had 24 stops, 13 in the final 20 minutes of play.
