

Summerside Items.

(From our own Correspondent.)

The shipping business appears to be rather brisk at present, and the wharves are presenting a lively appearance. On the 21st the brig *Vesta*, Claque, master, cleared for Martinique with 5,534 bushels white oats, 3,122 bushels black oats, 75 sheep, and 1,600 feet lumber, shipped by R. T. Holman, Esq. On the 26th, the brig *Willie Casey*, master, sailed for Queenstown for orders, with oats, butter, and deals, shipped by her owner, Hon. John Lefurgey. The bark *Lizzie Cameron*, Cameron master, is loading with oats at the Railway Wharf; bark *John F. Robertson*, McMillan master, loading with oats at Queen's Wharf, and the brig *Fanny*, Phillips, is also loading with oats at the Queen's Wharf. Besides the above, there are two schooners loading with potatoes, viz., *J. G. Huntington*, and the *Ellen May*.

During the past week, the schr. *J. G. Huntington*, Cunningham master, arrived from Portsmouth, N. H., with a cargo of apples in bulk, which were disposed of rapidly at the vessel. The schr. *Ellen May*, Westhaven, also brought a large quantity of apples.

The storm of Saturday, although the waves washed completely over the wharves, did not do much damage. The brig *Vesta*, bark *Lizzie Cameron*, brig *Nancy*, with a schooner from Arichat, were anchored during the storm near the new lighthouse. About 4 o'clock the schooner was driven ashore off Wellands Point, where she now lies within a few yards of the land.

In the *Progress* of last week we find the following under the heading of "Bad and Good": "We are proud to be in a position to congratulate Summerside upon the good behaviour of the Congregation which assembled at the Methodist Church on Wednesday evening last, to witness the happy event referred to in another column. "Honor to whom honor is due," and we hope to be able to chronicle the same good conduct on the part of all who may gather together on similar and other occasions in the future." The conduct on this occasion was, instead of being good, as the editor of the *Progress* would endeavor to make the readers of his paper believe, quite the contrary. In fact some of the townsfolk expressed their surprise at such a statement being made by the editor of the *Progress*. To give "honor to whom honor is due," is proper, but Summerside was no way honored by the conduct of a number of those who witnessed the marriage ceremony in the Methodist Church on the 20th instant. We believe the conduct in the Methodist Church was not a bit better than that in Charlottetown, if what the city press say about it is true, and we believe it is. Why the editor of the *Progress* should say that bad conduct is good, and that he wished to see the same good conduct in future, we are at a loss to see. Is it possible that the editor of the *Progress* does not know bad conduct from good? We have been informed by a number of those who attended, that even the officiating Minister had to ask for better order.

The Town Council had under consideration on Monday last, the subject of providing a supply of water in case of fire. The following resolution, moved by Councillor Rogers and seconded by Councillor McLeod, was passed:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to make arrangements with a competent mason to construct a tank of the following dimensions: twenty feet square and fourteen feet deep, to be properly built with brick and cement, and properly covered, and to be in all respects constructed in a workmanlike manner, to the satisfaction of the Town Council, or a competent person by them appointed to inspect the same; the site to be selected by the committee now named, and the work to be proceeded with immediately.

The committee are Messrs. D. Rogers, R. C. McLeod, and John McKenzie, with the chairman, D. Montgomery.

A Bye-Law is to be introduced at the next meeting of the Town Council, for the prevention of cruelty to animals. A law of this kind is badly needed.

The question of a Market House for Summerside was brought up for discussion at the meeting of the Council on Monday night last by Councillor McArthur. A majority of the Town Council are in favor of a Market House, but as the question of water-supply in case of fire, was considered to be of greater importance, the matter was laid over for a while. It was considered that the spring would be the best time to open the market. Meantime the matter will be agitated, and in the course of a few months a public meeting will be held, and the matter discussed, so as to obtain the voice of the people on the question.
