

is now quiet. Many of the rioters are now under arrest. The London Times this morning has an article on the Alabama claims in which it comments with severity on the last despatch on the subject, addressed by Secretary Seward to Mr. Adams. Life Guardsman O'Donnell, who was shot and badly wounded in this city by an unknown assassin, died to-day from his injuries. The official returns of the Bank of England show a decrease of 384,000 pounds sterling in bullion.

The Monitor of to-day states that the embarkation of soldiers at Toulon has ceased, and that no more troops will leave that port for Italy.

The Italians assert that 5000 French troops, under Gen. Follen, came to the assistance of the Papal forces during their last engagement with the insurgents, and the timely arrival of these reinforcements turned the battle, and caused the defeat of Garibaldi.

Information has been received from Rome that the Pontifical authorities intend to prosecute the citizens who voted in favor of union with Italy. The French Government has made representations to the Pope, advising that purpose being carried into effect.

Accounts of the late engagement near Rome have been received. During the battle on Sunday Garibaldi brought into action 20,000 men. At one time during the day the Papal troops were beaten, and Garibaldi was gaining ground, when the French came up and turned his victory into a defeat. It is now reported that the insurgents lost 800 killed and wounded, and 2000 prisoners.

Garibaldi is now in prison in Vigevano, in Piedmont. He claims that he is a citizen of the United States, and demands his privilege and rights as such under the laws of nations. The American Minister, Hon. G. P. Marsh, left Florence to visit the General. One division of the French troops which entered Rome already has been withdrawn from the city, and the rest will follow them soon. Those left for the relief of Rome remain at Civita Vecchia, and there await the action of Italy. The closing of the Paris Bourse to-day has been uneasy because of warlike preparations, and a general disarming is necessary to restore confidence. A call for a general conference of the European powers will soon be issued by the French Government. General Cialdini is in command of the Italian forces acting as an army of observation on the Papal frontier. He has made his headquarters at Pisa. Of the prisoners who were tried at Manchester before a special commission yesterday and to-day, Nugent, Braman, Ferrell, Caffy, and Marin have been acquitted. The visit of the Emperor of Austria to France has ended. His Majesty left Paris yesterday on his return to Vienna.

At the session of the special Commission to-day the counsel for the crown abandoned the count of murder in the remaining indictments, and all the prisoners now untied will be proceeded against on the charge of misdemeanor.

It is reported here on good authority that the Sultan of Turkey is making unusual military preparations. In support of this report it is stated that 5000 needle guns have recently been purchased by the Turkish war department, while large shipments of rifled guns have been made to the Turkish forces in Asia. It is also said that Government has been restoring the citadel, completing the walls, and otherwise strengthening the fortifications of Kara.

The greatest calamity that has befallen our community for a long time occurred here about 11 o'clock this forenoon, at which time the citizens of the ninth ward were startled by a loud explosion, which occurred in the mill building of Messrs. Reese, Graft and Bull. Upon visiting the scene of the catastrophe, it was discovered that a part of the building was blown to atoms, and about 20 persons killed and many wounded. The explosion occurred in the forge portion of the mill, and the building was soon in flames. The cause of the explosion will probably never be known, as the engineers and firemen were the only persons who could have given any information as to it, and they are among the killed. The loss of property will probably reach \$10,000.

The Massachusetts Election resulted in election Republican Governor by twenty-five thousand majority, and Repudiation of prohibitory Liquor Law, New York has gone democratic by ten thousand majority—New Jersey and Maryland same.

The movements of the Papal army, which since its repulses in the Provinces has been gradually consolidating and reforming in Rome, have been watched for some days past with great anxiety, as it was reported that the troops of His Holiness would assume the offensive against Garibaldi immediately after the entry of the French. The condition of affairs has been brought to a serious crisis by the action of the Pontifical army. Yesterday (Sunday) morning a large body of Papal soldiers advanced from the forts around Rome to the field. They were well supported by artillery. They marched on Garibaldi's headquarters, position situated between Tivoli, which is situated E. N. E. of Rome and Monte Rotondo. An engagement took place between the opposing forces. The fight was long and obstinately contested, a great many being killed and wounded on both sides. Garibaldi's force was defeated. The General retreated from the scene of action in good order, taking his wounded volunteers along with him.

When Garibaldi reached here this morning, on his way to Florence, the Italian officers on duty told him he must go to Spezia. Garibaldi drew a revolver, saying he would not resist the officers, but that he would not go willingly. The Italian soldiers then stepped forward and lifted him into the car. His sons would not go with him.

There is dissatisfaction among Ministerialists in both Houses. The Speech will be delivered to-morrow. Both Houses were opened in due form. Ladies and gentlemen in full dress in the body of the House. Place was well filled.

The Governor read speech well, then both Houses adjourned without doing business, except ordering some standing Committees and enacting former by-laws.

Sir John also officially announced the resignations of Hons Messrs. Archibald and Galt, in answer to question.

Hon. John Rose, of Montreal, is spoken of as Galt's successor.

The Nova Scotia Government was formed and sworn in to-day.

It consists of the following:—Vail, Provincial Secretary; Wilkins, Attorney General; Robertson, Commissioner of Mines, &c.; Annand, Treasurer and President of the Executive Council, Members of Council, without choice: Troop, Northrup, Flynn, Ferguson.

Owing to the prostration of the Newfoundland wares, there have been no cable despatches for the past few days. The Dominion Parliament is to close about the 19th of December, and resume in February.
