

Yankees Rip Red Sox; Baltimore, Indians Lose

BOSTON (AP)—Right hander Jim Bouton posted his first victory since last June 30 with relief help from Steve Hamilton and Pete Ramos Sunday as New York Yankees defeated Boston Red Sox 5-3.

Bouton, who had a 4-15 record last year and had appeared in only two previous games this season, checked the Red Sox on four hits until he tired in the seventh.

George Smith led off the Boston seventh with a homer. Bouton retired the next two batters, but was lifted after Rico Petrocelli doubled.

Roger Maris sent New York off to a 3-4 first inning lead with his fourth homer.

After Boston tied the score the Yankees nailed down the decision with three runs in the sixth.

BALTIMORE (AP)—Baltimore Orioles won a suspended game 6-5 on Russ Snyder's 12th-inning single and then lost Sunday's regulation contest to Kansas City Athletics 9-4 after blowing a three-run lead.

The loss ended the Orioles six-game winning streak.

Snyder's single ended the first game since a city curfew suspended play at 11:30 p.m. Saturday night.

The hit came off Roland Sheldon, who started the next game after a 20-minute rest and failed to last the first inning as the Orioles scored three runs.

But Kansas City scored two runs off Baltimore starter Wally Bunker in the second and chased him after loading the bases with one out in the third.

The Athletics scored three runs in the inning.

The Orioles crept to within 5-4 with an unearned run in the fifth, but the Athletics erupted for four more runs in the ninth—two on Bert Campaneris' homer.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Harmon Killebrew's fifth home run in six games broke a 4-4 tie in the sixth inning and Minnesota went on to a 9-4 victory over Cleveland Sunday that snapped the Twins five-game losing streak.

Killebrew smashed his ninth homer with the bases empty.

The Twins routed Sonny Siebert, 4-3, in the seventh. Rich Rollins' single scoring two runs and Tony Oliva single producing a third run.

The Indians had tied the score 4-4 in the top of the sixth on Max Avlis' homer with the bases empty.

Jimmie Hall closed the Twins scoring in the eighth when he

ANAHEIM (AP)—Don Wert drove in six runs Sunday, helping Detroit take a doubleheader from California Angels 8-4 and 4-1.

The Detroit third baseman knocked in four runs in the opener.

Wert's two-run single in the second inning of the nightcap provided the margin of victory over right hander Howie Reed. The victory went to Joe Spina, who needed relief help from Orlando Pena after allowing a sixth-inning homer to Joe Adcock.

Dave Wicksham got credit for the first game victory.

CHICAGO (AP)—Gary Peters pitched six innings of no-hit ball and wound up with a two-hitter as Chicago White Sox completed a doubleheader sweep by whipping Washington 12-0 Sunday.

Tommy Agee drove in all of Chicago's runs in a 4-1 opening game triumph.

Peters, who had not pitched since he strained his pitching arm 14 days ago, held the Senators hitless until Ken McMullen led off the seventh with a base hit past third baseman Don Buford. He then went on to provide the White Sox with their sixth shutout in the last 10 games, allowing only a two-out single by Frank Howard in the ninth.

The White Sox sweep lifted them into fourth place, 5 1/2 games behind American League-leading Cleveland.

While Peters was setting down the Senators with ease, the White Sox put together a 15-hit attack.

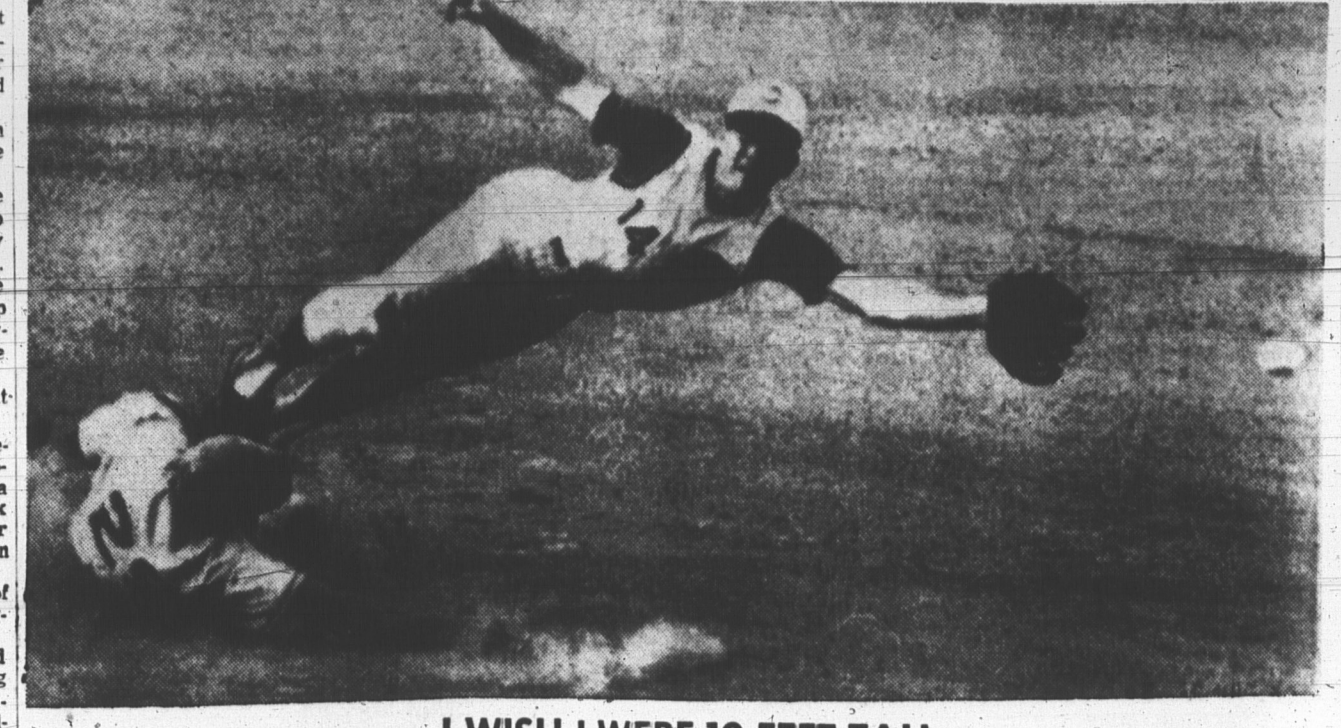
Chicago collected only four hits. Agee hit his fifth homer in the third inning after Lee Elia and Al Weis singled.

ATLANTA (AP)—The struggling Atlanta Braves unloaded against St. Louis Sunday, scoring seven runs before the Cardinals retired a batter in the fifth inning and rolling to a 14-4 victory.

It was the Braves' third straight victory after seven consecutive losses.

The Cardinals led 4-3 before the Braves' outburst—their biggest of the season—in which they had five singles, three walks and a hit batsman and were helped by Jerry Buchek's error on a double play ball.

CINCINNATI (AP)—Leo Cardenas of Cincinnati walloped four homers and drove in eight runs Sunday as the Reds split a doubleheader with Chicago Cubs, winning the opener 8-3 before losing 9-5.

Billy Williams' two-out, two-run single brought the Cubs from behind in the ninth inning of the nightcap as they erupted for five runs.

Cardenas, who had six hits for the day, hit two homers in each game and was one shy of tying Stan Musial's major league record of five home runs for a doubleheader set in 1954.
