**BOARD OF TRADE.**

The general quarterly meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade was held in the Masonic Temple last evening. Horace Hazard, Esq., presided, and there was a good attendance of members. After reading the minutes of last meeting letters were read from T. M. Kirkwood on direct steamship connection between P. E. Island and Great Britain.

A communication was also read from the British Columbia Board of Trade treating of trade with the Klondyke district; and another from J. A. Chipman, of Halifax, on Canadian trade with the West Indies.

Mr. G. F. Beer's name was proposed for membership.

The President then reported that the rates on freight on the I. C. R. from P. E. Island had again been changed, making an increase over last year's rate, which would mean a loss to our shippers as they had been figuring on last year's schedule. He also stated that together with Mr. W. H. Aitken and Hon. D. Farquharson, he had interviewed Sir L. H. Davies on the matter and Sir Louis had telegraphed Mr. Pottinger, of the I. C. R., as follows:

"Charlottetown Board complains that the reduced rates Island produce, I. C. R. given last autumn have been withdrawn this autumn and increased rates substituted. Will be very glad if you can win me last year's rates will be continued."

As the Minister of Railways is about to visit our city it was moved, seconded and carried that a committee of three be appointed to wait on him with regard to the reduction of freight rates. The committee are: H. Hazard, W. H. Aitken and N. Rattenbury. This committee will also interview the Minister of Railways re the extension of the P. E. Island Railway along the water front of Charlottetown and bring other railway matters to his notice.

The matter of telegraph service between P. E. Island and the Mainland was also discussed and it was decided to continue the agitation until the grievance complained of is remedied.

The meeting then adjourned.
