—The speech of Senator Ferguson setting forth the fact that nothing from Prince Edward Island is to be seen at the Paris Exhibition and showing that Prince Edward Island was deprived of a representative at Paris by reason of the negotiations with Pineau is published by THE EXAMINER of to-day. It will be found worthy of careful perusal, even though some of the facts stated are already known to the people of this Province.

—Montreal Star: It is not astonishing that ten Liberals could not gulp down that majority report on the emergency ration scandal. The marvel is that four Liberals could be found who should think it plausible enough to carry even in an intensely partisan House. That it will carry weight in the country is not for a moment imagined, except by those who fancy that few have read the evidence.

—One of the chief topics of discussion among thinking citizens is the rapid development of Imperialism, both in the British Colonies and in the United States.
