J. G. Davies, manager of CNR Maritime area, yesterday said "there has been a change in ice conditions, and the Prince Edward Island is operating again to maintain the two-ship schedule of 20 crossings a day. The weather outlook is such that we hope to be able to maintain this service in the foreseeable future."

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says under clear skies overnight, temperatures in most localities dropped well below zero, but with considerable sunshine during the forenoon; there will be a quick recovery. Although there is little change from the forecast of clear skies at night alternating with cloudy skies in the afternoon for the next day or two, temperatures will tend to climb gradually.

Regional forecasts: Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Eastern New Brunswick Counties, Lower St. John River Valley: Sunny, becoming cloudy with a few clear periods and scattered snowflurries near noon; not quite so cold; winds light, increasing to northerly 15 this afternoon; low-high at Halifax 8 below 20 above, Yarmouth 5 below, 30 above, Kentville 8 below 20 above, New Glasgow 15 below, 20 above, Goshen 15 below, 18 above, Sydney 5 below, 18 above, Charlottetown 9 below, 18 above, Moncton 10 below, 18 above, Fredericton and Saint John 12 below, 18 above; outlook for Thursday, sunny and a little milder.

High tide today at Charlottetown 12:37 a.m. and 1:09 p.m. At Rustico at 8:12 a.m. and 8:06 p.m. Summer tide eighteen minutes later than Charlottetown. Sun rises today at 5:57 a.m. and sets at 5:57 p.m.

It was reported that nine children were placed in adoption homes during the year, while 18 unmarried mothers were helped for in the confinement and care of their babies.

Lorne Murphy, executive director of the Prince County Welfare Society, was guest speaker at the meeting.

Mr. Murphy, upon graduation from St. Dunstan's University, worked with Catholic Charities in Montreal for two years. He was a member of the R.C.A.F. after which he attended the Maritime School of Social Work and upon graduation, rejoined the R.C.A.F. where he was employed as a social worker for one year.

He was appointed executive director of the Prince County Welfare Agency in 1965.

Mr. MacNutt suggested that the Protestant Family Service Bureau and the Catholic Welfare Bureau continue to meet periodically for the exchange of ideas and the pursuing of plans to improve welfare service.

It was reported that in November, a joint committee was formed on the both bureaus to study mutual needs and to act as a fact-finding committee, relative to social welfare developments, which may apply to the community.

"This committee, said Mr. MacNutt, has had several meetings with local and provincial government officials and we feel that a much better understanding of our mutual problems now exists."

ASSISTED NEEDY — The Protestant Family Service Bureau worked with 170 needy families last year, reported Executive Director, Elizabeth Torrey. She said that the families requiring assistance are those with many problems which may be the cause of their poor financial state.

"The bureau helped 66 families last year where illness was the principal social problem," said Miss Torrey who expressed hope for construction of a subsidized low rental housing for low income families in the City of Charlottetown in the near future, said Miss Torrey.

It was stated that along with the Catholic Welfare Bureau, the Protestant Family Service Bureau administers certain material (relief) on behalf of the City Council. This is done on a three-way cost-sharing basis between the City, provincial and Dominion Governments, with the City and Provincial Government contributing 25 percent each. This arrangement has required periodic conferences with the local and provincial government officials, to discuss needs, and the ways and means to meet them.

A meeting and display in connection with Studio Girls Cosmetics will be held on Friday.

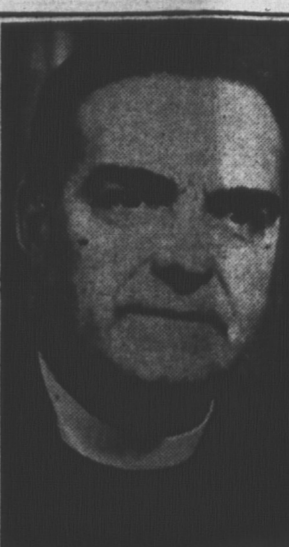
The hotel is also engaged in outside catering and weddings this week.

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## Boarding Of Children Seen Big Expense

The amount spent for the boarding of children awaiting adoption is one of the largest annual expenditures of the Protestant Family Service Bureau, it was learned from the president's report at the annual meeting of the Protestant Family Service last night.

The president's report which reviewed the bureau's work during 1965 was given by the chairman Reginald MacNutt, past president, acting president in the absence of President Ralph Rupert.

"An expenditure of approximately \$6,000 was required for the boarding of children awaiting adoption in 1965," said Mr. MacNutt who expressed hope for government's assumption of this expense which is believed to be its logical responsibility.
