

# Scores Godon Report For Frustrating Words

Strong criticism of certain "frustrating" statements in the Gordon Commission report on Maritime economic ills was voiced by Judge W.J. Lindal, of Winnipeg, chairman of the National Employment Committee, Unemployment Insurance Commission, who was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon meeting of Rotary at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday. The subject of his address was "Minority and Area Rights".

The speaker was introduced by President G.C. Fisher and thanked by co-chairman Frank MacDonald, Capt. Claude Hunter was chairman. Two new members were introduced by their sponsors; Don Martin by H. H. Simpson and Ralph Balderston by J. C. Montgomery. They were welcomed by the president and assigned committee duty.

**PRIMARY PRINCIPLE**  
In the course of his address Judge Lindal said "It is Canada we are building and all of Canada. That is and must be the primary principle in all our undertakings and projects. The niceties of economics, debits and credits, red or black temporary balance sheets; it all is important but it must be relegated to second or even lower positions in the evolution of this Nation of destiny."

"I have little patience with some current statements to 'assist the people of the Atlantic Provinces' he said. "What is required is a positive and comprehensive approach to the problem of this Atlantic region. With this as the objective, it is suggested that the people of Canada as a whole might be willing to assist the people of the Atlantic Provinces in discovering, developing and making the best use of the resources in that area."

The best approach in the writings I have come across on this subject is to be found in an article by John D. Pattison in Saturday night: "The Maritimes have felt, with just cause, that compensation for the economic penalties suffered from Confederation was inadequate. Such compensation is quite different from a handout. Rather, it is a redistribution of the benefits of nationhood, in keeping with the costs."

**CITES REPORT**  
"The most frustrating statement of all is to be found in the Gordon Report: 'If it should turn out that there is not the necessary combination of resources in sufficient quantities to permit a substantial rise in living standards in the Atlantic region, generous assistance should be given to those people who might wish to move to other parts of Canada where they may be greater opportunities'."

Generous Assistance to Get Out!  
The tragedy is that people who write or think that way do not realize or do not want to realize what it is that is building here across Canada from Ocean to Ocean. It is not a cabbage that the housewife holds up and lops off every leaf showing the slightest signs of discoloring or decay. I am not familiar with your potential programmes of economic development. A. The P.E.I. Causeway; b. The Passamaquoddy Bay Power Project; c. Converting your Coal into electric power; d. The Chignecto Canal; e. The giant inter-lake project on the South coast of Newfoundland. A.P.E.C. and you yourselves know all the details.

**FIRST QUESTION**  
I am concerned only with the

approach to these undertakings. The first question to be asked and it should be asked not only in the Maritimes but by every serious minded Canadian: Will the project help to build Canada? Details of costs must be viewed in the light of the answer to the first, the fundamental question.

And so I speak not of the Maritimes seeking by themselves to build this part of Canada, laudable though their efforts are. I prefer to say that we, Canadians, from Charlottetown to Saskatoon and Victoria, join in building this and other parts of Canada, that Canada may the better fulfill her destiny, a destiny perhaps more divine than human, and in the building, we can repeat as the voice of Canada, the prophetic, the inspired words of Robert Browning:

"I go to prove my soul!  
I see my way as birds their trackless way.  
I shall arrive! What time, what circuit first,  
I ask not."

## ROCKY POINT OCTOGENARIAN A Sturdy Individualist

Most people find a five-day trip by horse and cart, with more than a ton of coal for baggage, and the individual is 87 years old, "excursion" is really something to undertake, although it doesn't phase Michael John Murphy, of Rocky Point.

"It's my hobby, and better than going by car", Mr. Murphy told the Guardian Monday afternoon at the Rocky Point Wharf, where he waited for the last ferry crossing while his trusty horse munched some hay. Mr. Murphy was on the last leg of his most recent trip, which began last Thursday at 2:15 p.m. when he left the w.o.s.f., headed for New Glasgow, N.S. "I was over there last year, and may go back again next week", he said.

Remarking on his trip, the hardy islander said he had come over via Wood Islands last evening, and was only able to travel about 10 miles before catching up on some sleep. To compensate for the travel disruption, he arose at 5:00 a.m. Monday and covered the remaining thirty miles in time for the ferry.

"I sure enjoyed the trip, but I've lost all my power altogether", the jovial old man said, adding that "I saw the day I could get under a wagon and lift the wheels off the ground". As further proof of his former prowess, he recalled that he once lifted 1,000 pounds four inches off the ground.

**NO DIFFICULTY**  
Mr. Murphy said he had experienced no difficulty in getting the wagon on and off the boats, and that his horse had performed remarkably well, asked about his horse, Mr. Murphy said "He's very quiet and deaf—I don't call him at all—he's got to know me. You have to eat rough grub not too much sweets and sleep on a hard bed". Mr. Murphy advised, stating that he had slept on the floor for two weeks when he was visiting Saskatchewan. "I woke up a few mornings with my hair frozen to the roof, and the chin following a long drink from a bottle of milk, given to him on the return journey. Mr. Murphy consulted his watch, impatient to be on the road once again. "I got the watch in 1904", he said, noting that repairs were required only twice—in a blacksmith shop.

With departure time at hand, the old man mounted the wagon, a gentle pull on the reins sufficed for a starter, and the one-horse-powered vehicle was in motion. "I'm as healthy as a trout and all set to vote, but I am glad to be getting near home, for I'm a bit tired", he said, as the loaded wagon rumbled toward the ferry.
