Continued from page 1 but which will enable us to grow stronger in the years to come.

Reduction Possible In 1954

"If new international tensions do not develop, and if no further aggressions are attempted, I hope we will be able to reduce budget expenditures after the fiscal year 1954."

Truman's message contained an appeal to congress to authorize the St. Lawrence seaway and power project. The President said that while the potential hydro-electric power would be sufficient reason for developing the seaway, its importance in transporting iron ore would make it a "straight necessity."

The budget Truman sent to congress today is for the 1953 fiscal year, which begins July 1, 1952. It is \$14,500,000,000 larger than this year's budget and \$45,300,000,000 larger than the government's spending program in 1950, the last full fiscal year before the outbreak of war in Korea.

The President said it may well push the national debt as high as the present law allows—to \$275,000,000,000 by June 30, 1953. Interest alone on the debt accounts for seven per cent of the new budget.

Truman earmarked more than three-fourths of his budget for "major national security programs"—the armed forces, foreign aid, atomic energy, promotion of defence production and economic stability, civil defence and merchant marine.

Military Plans

He proposed \$51,200,000,000 for the military services alone, to give the United States:

A total of 3,700,000 men in the armed forces by mid-1953—An increase of 100,000 over the planned total at the middle of this year.

An air force of 143 wings. (A wing varies from 30 heavy bombers to 75 jet fighters plus necessary supporting elements.)

An army of 21 divisions. A navy with 408 major combatant vessels and 16 large carrier air groups. A marine corps of three divisions.

The President also asked \$10,844,000,000 for "international security and foreign relations"—most of it in the form of military assistance to the country's European and other Allies.

Well Known Farmer Died Yesterday

...Residents of Montague and vicinity learned with deep regret of the passing of Mr. Fred G. MacIntyre in his 71st year at the Kings County Hospital early yesterday morning after a lengthy illness.

The late Mr. MacIntyre was born at Brudenell, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William MacIntyre. He received his early education at Brudenell, and then engaged in farming. Later he purchased a large acreage on the Queens Road near Montague where he successfully carried on farming operations. For many years his farm was used as an experimental farm, and he had a large acreage under cultivation.

In 1946 Mr. MacIntyre converted approximately 30 acres of his farm to the cultivation of strawberries, and in a few years was recognized as one of the leading strawberry growers in Canada.

Always interested in sport, the late Mr. MacIntyre was a charter member of the Montague Curling Club, and served in several offices including vice-president and president in 1947. In 1948-1949 he was president of the P. E. I. Curling Association. Through all the years of his curling activities he maintained a lively interest in the game, and through it won many friends across the Maritimes.

Besides his sorrowing widow, nee Katie Rourke, he leaves to mourn one daughter, Miriam, at home, and three sons, Bruce and Clive at home, and Garnet in Montague. Also surviving is one sister, Ottilie, Mrs. Joseph Trotter, Boston, Mass.; and a brother, Edson, in Brudenell.

The funeral will be held Wednesday at 2:30 P.M. from the Baptist Church, Montague. The residents of Montague and vicinity are extending their deepest sympathy to the family in their sad bereavement.
