The president, Mrs. Alexander Martin presided and the meeting opened with the Island Hymn, followed by the Mary Stewart collect. The address of welcome was given by Mrs. William Bruce and Mrs. Stanley MacLeod of Heatherdale WI responded. The minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary, Mrs. Harry Van Buskirk. Each Institute gave a report of the year's work which showed that groups have been engaged in many phases of work for the community, school and different organizations. A contest was sponsored by Caladonia WI and Bellevue entertained with a sing-song led by Mrs. A. J. MacPherson. Greetings were brought from the provincial executive by Mrs. Lincoln Dewar, New Perth, who expressed pleasure at being present and commended the work being done by the local institutes. She also gave an informative resume of Institute projects at the provincial level. Theresa MacLeod, director of women's work congratulated the members on the fine display of handicrafts, needlepoint, embroidery and painting, which were attractively arranged by Valleyfield WI. She also spoke on the theme of the convention "Learning Together". Patricia Peters representative from the WI office gave a very interesting demonstration to home-makers on freezing and care of a "Deep Freezer", outlining the proper way to package meats and the best kind of paper to use for wrapping foods for a freezer. She also displayed several suitable containers. John Yeo from Montague Regional High school gave a talk on education. He outlined the special course program being taught at the high school this year and mentioned the need for a Vocational school in Kings Co., he suggested that the Women's Institutes and any organizations in the area give their support to this matter. David Peacock, Montague, spoke on gardening and cultivating the soils, and of fertilizers that would be best suited to different plants. He said a lot of the success in gardening depended on the selection of good seed and healthy plants. Resolutions had to do with standardizing school books, common law living, and afternoon TV programs for children, etc. These will be forwarded for consideration by the provincial convention in July. The 1966 convention will be held in Kilmory. The convention adjourned with "The Queen" and supper was served to the delegates and guests by the members of Valleyfield Institute.
