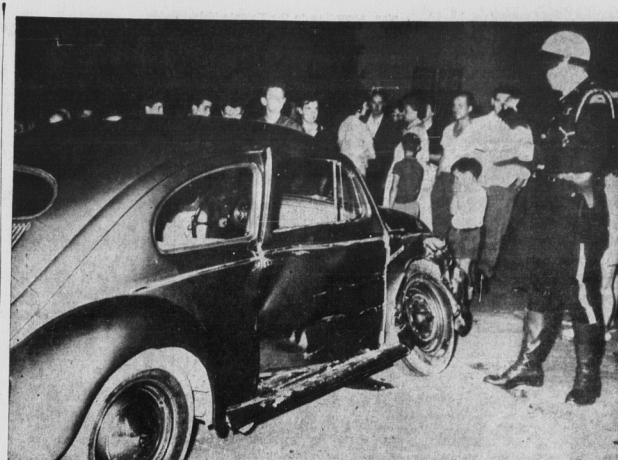


Plans For York Concert Finalized

The concert committee, Leith Brown, Arthur Vesey, Harry Vesey, Mrs. Ruben Waite, Mr. A. Frank Vesey and Mrs. Richard Vesey met recently in York hall to finalize plans for their fall production, in aid of their newly renovated hall, scheduled to open Oct. 29 and continue nightly (except Thursday) through Nov. 1.

The business manager, Leith Brown, announced that the complete house for Tuesday, Nov. 5 has been reserved by the Village of Morel and that tickets for other performances would soon be made available to the general public. Arthur Vesey and Harry Vesey, who in charge of the program, stated that the two one-act comedies are already chosen and cast, and that the remainder of the two-hour variety show will consist of short numbers of a novel and musical nature and will feature the guest artist, Miss Arlene MacDonald.

Due to a change in seating arrangements, it was found that the hall will now seat 520 persons so that, except for opening night (and Nov. 5), this number of tickets may be sold for each performance. It was decided to order a total of 2,500 program booklets and that all advertising in connection with these books should be completed and in the hands of the program compiler, Mrs. George White-way, by Oct. 1.

AFTERMATH OF LIGHTNING STRIKE

Sydney Street in Charlottetown on Saturday afternoon could almost be mistaken for a scene in London during the last war with all the broken glass and rubble on the road. This was taken shortly after

a lightning bolt destroyed the chimney and stone work at the rear of Trinity United Church. Lightning and flying bricks wrought havoc in the area knocking many windows, poking holes in roofs and bat-

tering automobiles. The same storm knocked out the power in the Charlottetown area for several hours, generally gave everyone quite a fright.

where lightning burst through. Many windows in the area were smashed and at least four cars and a truck received a battering from the flying particles.

A Volkswagen car belonging to Roger MacLaren, 205 Sydney Street, had the roof puffed in and the rear window broken by falling brick. Fred Roberts took the road window of his car. A New Brunswick car and at least one other vehicle also received damage.

A gaping hole appeared in the roof of 205 Sydney St. where a bolt of lightning passed through. Power was disrupted for hours as wires in the immediate vicinity were down and a transformer in the Federal Building was damaged. Power company linemen responded to over a hundred calls in and around the city.

Lightning was seen to be dancing along wires, the top of the roof of the Confederation Memorial structure and Woolworth's in the city and as far away as the Southwest Country Club. Residents saw the lightning which struck the church signalled the end of the storm here.

Part-Time Resident Here Dies In Washington, D.C.

Funeral services were held Saturday in Washington, D.C., for Mrs. Elmer Harris, 35 wife of the playwright who wrote Johnny Belinda. Mrs. Harris died Aug. 29 in George Washington University hospital of cancer.

Mrs. Harris, a native of Charlotte, Iowa lived with her husband in Beverly Hills, California and Prince Edward Island where the Harris' have maintained a country home since 1928.

For the last month she had been living with her son, Victor Harris, at 867 Jordan Road, Washington, D.C. He is assistant eastern regional manager of the autonomy division of North American Aviation Corporation.
