Hockey League Is Formed At Meeting in Summerside

The formation of the Prince County Hockey League was completed at a meeting held at C.J.R.W. last night, with Bob Schurman in the chair. Four teams will compete, Border Nationals, O'Leary, Summerside

Combines, and Summerside Junior Legionaires. The first game will be played at Civic Stadium on Friday, November 22 between Border and the Juniors. The home team in this game will hand over their cut of the gate receipts to the "Tribune Relief Fund" and in the next three games the cut of the home teams will be split four ways.

Team representatives for the teams are as follows: Border—Bill Crain, Man Burchill, O'Leary—Orville Willis and Chester McMarkin, Juniors—Joe Clark and Grant Gray, Benny Gray represented the Combines with another man to be named later.
