

# Commonwealth Team Takes Lead In Tuna Cup Matches

WEDGPORT, N.S. (CP) — A Yarmouth, N.S., druggist Thursday boosted the British Commonwealth team into the lead in the second day of the 13th international tuna cup matches. Alfred Trask's 648 pounder was the only catch of the day.

As a result, the Commonwealth team, with 1,048 points, is in first place. In second place, on the strength of the biggest fish taken on the first day, is Argentina with 849 points.

The British team took 400 bonus points for the day's long catch. Germany is third with 619 points and the United States fourth with 426.

Trask got his strike while fishing the mouth of the Tusket River. The big bluefin was aboard in 40 minutes.

**TREND BROKEN**  
It was the fourth fish taken this year by a newcomer to international competition. Trask is a first year member on the Commonwealth team. Wednesday's catches were also by match newcomers.

Trask's catch broke what some of the fishermen, guides and officials thought might become a "first day trend."

The 1955 tournament was won by the U.S. on the strength of one of three fish taken in the first day of competition.

The 13th international match raced opened Wednesday with three tuna gaffed.

All boats headed for Soldier's Rip at dawn Thursday but there was no action and by noon 21 boats were working the mouth of the Tusket River and only three cruised the rip.

For nine years, Soldier's Rip was the exclusive hunting ground but when a hurricane struck in 1953 on the eve of the tournament officials decided to give participants a little more leeway for the second and third day fishing.

This year the decision of where the fishing best was left to the guides.

# B.C. Lions To Pay \$15,000 To W.I.F.U. In Share-The-Wealth

VANCOUVER (CP)—British Columbia Lions will undoubtedly pay the maximum amount of \$15,000 into the Western Interprovincial Football Union treasury this fall to help WIFU clubs with smaller gate receipts, says Lions general manager Phil Webb.

In three league games this season, attendance for Lions' games here averaged 29,312 compared with 25,150 in eight home games last season.

Under the new share-the-wealth arrangement the league is experimenting with, the league's average attendance will be computed at the end of this season. Each club will contribute 25 cents for each paid admission over the average. Clubs drawing less than the average will receive 25 cents for every customer they are under.

The maximum a club will shell out is \$15,000.

On last year's attendance, it was estimated Lions would have paid received \$7,000 and Calgary \$14,700 and Edmonton and Winnipeg about \$100 each. Saskatchewan Roughriders would have peders \$8,000.

# Gerry Magee In Semi-Finals In U.S. Golf Championship

LAKE FOREST, Ill. (AP)—Gerry Magee of Toronto won 2 and 1 Thursday from Californian Ted Gleichmann to move into the semi-finals of the United States amateur golf championships.

Magee's opponent in the semi-finals today over 36 holes will be veteran Chuck Koosis of Royal Oak, Mich., who beat 20-year-old Rex Baxter of Amarillo, Tex., 3 and 2 in their quarter-final match.

Magee, conqueror in the fourth round of Walker Cup player Don Cherry, nipped Neil Gronquist of Minneapolis 1 up in morning play.

Defending champion Harvie Ward of San Francisco won 3 and 2 in the quarter-finals over Arnold Blum of Macon, Ga., and meets Joe Campbell of Anderson, Ind., the 1955 collegiate champion.

# New 'Cat Stadium' Is Proposed

HAMILTON CP — A group of businessmen has approached Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Big Four Football Union and proposed the building of a \$1,000,000, 30,000-seat football stadium on the outskirts of the city.

Tickets now use Civic Stadium, which accommodates approximately 20,000. Tiger-Cat officials have considered the proposal but have not gone into details.

The Ticats have had little success with the civic parks board in pressing for larger entrances to Civic Stadium and greater seating capacity.

# Macpherson Clan Holds Gathering

TORONTO (CP) — Canadian descendants of the clan Macpherson, 5,000 strong, will gather here during the weekend amid the skirl of bagpipes and swirl of kilts.

Actually the Macpherson clan, descendants of the Sons of the Parson with a Scottish wildcat as their emblem, has seven sub-clans, all entitled to wear the grey and black, yellow and white dress tartan.

The Parson was Muriach, parson of Kingsussie and chief of the clan Chattan, who gave the Macphersons their origin as a clan in 1173.

Gathering with the Macphersons will be the Murdoch, Cattinach, Gilles, Gillespie, MacMurdo and MacVurich, all clan names.

Founder of the clan association in Canada and its secretary is Colonel Ernest Ronald Rivers-Macpherson of Ottawa, former Gordon highlander, world traveller and deep sea fisherman.

Chairman of the Canadian clansman is Dr. Cluny Macpherson of St. John's, Nfld., inventor of the gas mask in 1915.

# Sportsmen Buys Arctic Prince

DONCASTER, Yorkshire (CP) Canadian sportsman Max Bell Wednesday paid £5,040 for a chestnut colt by Arctic Prince out of Flatter.

The colt was purchased at the Doncaster yearling sales by the Anglo-Irish Agency on behalf of the Calgary newspaper publisher. The colt was one of 10 yearlings sent to the sales by F. F. Tuthill. Nine were sold for a total of £23,793.

A filly by the famous Nearco went for 8,000 guineas to British trainer Noel Murless.

Fifty-one lots, including two private sales, were sold during the morning and realized £91,224. Aggregate for the corresponding session last year was £97,566.

There was no immediate indication which present Stampeder import Harrowood would replace.

Formerly with the Calgary club, Harrowood has been on Blue Bombers reserve list this year. In 1955 he was named to the Western Interprovincial Football Union defensive all-star team.

# Federal Pilot Canning Plant Shows The Way

MORDEN, Man. (CP) — Manitoba's young, but fast-growing canning industry, has received a shot in the arm from the federal department of agriculture's experimental station here.

This laboratory is finding the answers to questions such as: What are the best varieties of vegetables for canning in Manitoba and what are the criteria for determining when they are at their best?

Dr. A.L. Shewfelt of the laboratory is narrowing down the number of recommended varieties of each main vegetable crop. The objective of 10 varieties of each has virtually been reached.

New emphasis is on testing these crops with an eye to taste, tenderness and maturity. Products are canned on a small scale and data is kept on the canning of each variety.

In winter a panel of experts will taste the products and the results will be checked against canning records as a guide to processors and producers.

Ten years ago when the laboratory was opened there was one canning establishment. It went out of existence in 1950. Now there are three, producing an average of 400,000 cases of vegetables every year. Another plant is expected to open soon.

The new director of the Morden farm is Dr. C. C. Strachan, a graduate of University of British Columbia, who took post-graduate work at the Universities of Oregon and Massachusetts.

For 20 years he was at the federal agriculture department's experimental station in Summerland, B.C., and played an important role in the development of the B.C. canning industry.

# Study Flora, Fauna And Bugs

FUNK ISLANDS, Nfld. (CP)—Fourteen thousand seabirds on 40 miles off the northeast shoulder of Newfoundland are sporting new identification bracelets.

Dominion wildlife officer Les Truck and provincial wildlife officer Doug Pimlott visited here in July and did the banding job in 11 days.

In addition to banding 14,000 Atlantic murrelets, locally called turs, the men also banded 300 kittiwakes and did an inventory of the seabird species on the islands. The Funk Island murre colony is the largest in North America.

Eight species of birds were discovered nesting on the Funks: Puffins, auks, gannets, two species of murrelets and three species of gulls.

**MANY NESTS**  
The biologists counted 1,202 gannet nests, indicating the colony has increased rapidly. Only seven pairs were found there in 1936. The Funks are the second largest gannet colony in Newfoundland—the largest is at Cape St. Mary's.

With one exception all banded murre recoveries have been local. One was found dead on a Massachusetts beach.

Mr. Truck collected Funk Island insects to be turned over to an entomologist for classification. "I don't know what they are," he said — "lice, flies ticks and things."

Prof. Ernest Releau of the University of Montreal, a botanist, went along on the expedition to Funk Island flora is of interest to scientists because it grows so far from the mainland and survives a rigorous climate and assaults from sea and storm.
