# Maritime Senior Hockey League Formed Yesterday

A four team Maritime Senior Hockey League (M.S.H.L.) comprising Charlottetown, Summerside, Moncton and Amherst was formed yesterday afternoon at an enthusiastic meeting held in Charlottetown.

Working together in harmonious fashion the various representatives agreed that the League should open in early November, be comprised of home brew players, play three games per team a week and elected Elwin Casey of Amherst as President.

With each team boasting one or more former "Big Four" players along with a strong lineup of senior players the feeling prevailed throughout the meeting that the new league should be the strongest and mostly evenly balanced in the Maritimes.

Among such name players likely to perform in the circuit are Shermie White, Lou and Dave Kiley of Amherst, Wild Bill LeBlanc, Vic Howe and Ben Gaudet of Moncton (Vic Howe is a brother of Gordie Howe and tried out with the New York Rangers). Buck Whitlock and Orin Carver of Charlottetown, Lorne Hennessey of Summerside.

Although well sprinkled with outstanding players the league officials yesterday quickly passed a resolution forbidding the importing of players from outside the Maritimes. Each team will be allowed to bring in one player from some centre in the Maritime Branch to bolster their own local squad.

There will be three games a week for each team. Teams will play two games at home one week and one home game the following week.

No definite starting date has been established but it will likely be the first or second week of November. Amherst will open at Moncton and Charlottetown at Summerside.

After electing Elwin Casey of Amherst as President the meeting decided that the executive would be comprised of two members from each club plus a secretary Mr. Scott of Amherst. To defray operational expenses

each team will pay \$25.00 into the League immediately.

Another meeting will be held at the Windsor Hotel, Moncton next Sunday afternoon at one o'clock to draw up a schedule and iron out other details.

Representatives at yesterday's meeting were Lorne Hennessey and Charlie Hogan, Vance Harris, Summerside; Orin Carver and Alex Matheson, Charlottetown; Shermie White and Frank Porter, Amherst; Norm Crossman and Ralph Chapman, Moncton. Henry Shea of Amherst presided.

DETROIT (AP)—Chris Shaban, manager of Canadian light-heavyweight Yvon Durelle, said Saturday he and his fighter will welcome a chance at Archie Moore's light-heavyweight title, "particularly in Montreal."

"It would be quite a thing in Montreal," Shaban said, "and I understand promoter Eddie Quinn is going to try to contact Moore about it in Los Angeles."

Shaban said Durelle, a native of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., would give Moore a much better fight than Tony Anthony did before being knocked out in the seventh round of his challenge at Los Angeles Friday night.

Durelle and Anthony fought to a 10-round draw at Detroit's Olympia Stadium last spring in Anthony's last encounter before Moore. Anthony fought the late rounds in a wobbly haze against Durelle and several times was on the verge of being knocked out.

SAW FIGHT ON TV  
Moore said after disposing of Anthony that he would like to tangle with Durelle in a match for the 171-pound crown.

Shaban said Durelle, who watched the Anthony-Moore go on television, thought the challenger was backing up too much to hit very hard.

"I know," he added, "that Durelle can take a better punch than Anthony."

Shaban, however, was full of praise for Moore. He described him as "about the smartest guy I've ever seen."

"Anthony hit much harder against Durelle," he continued, "but maybe Durelle can't cover up as good as Moore."

Shaban and Durelle are here preparing for a televised 10-rounder at Olympia next Wednesday against Willi Besmanoff, a German heavyweight.

SUGAR RAY GOES AGAINST CARMEN BASILIO TONIGHT  
NEW YORK (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson, still a ring master at the age of 37, pits his experience and knockout power against rugged Carmen Basilio, a crowding puncher in their battle for the world middleweight championship tonight at Yankee Stadium.

Despite Robinson's unprecedented feat of winning the middleweight title four times, he has been the underdog since the match first was suggested. Welterweight champ Basilio, seven years younger and about seven pounds lighter, has been favored at odds ranging from 6 to 5 up to 8 to 5. However, there is a solid bloc that insists Sugar Ray will be the choice at ring time.

Early talk of a \$1,000,000 gate stopped when Robinson threatened to pull out of the fight in a dispute over theatre television receipts. The damage never has been fully repaired.

International Boxing Club officials now talk of 40,000 fans and receipts of \$700,000.

There will be no home television of this 15-round match but theatre television will be shown in 173 theatres with 500,000 seats. Robinson has been guaranteed \$25,000 and Basilio \$10,000 from this source alone, a concrete victory for Sugar Ray in his showdown strike.

The fight will start at 10:30 p.m. EDT, half an hour later than usual and will be heard on radio, with the CBC Dominion network carrying it to Canadian listeners.
