23 Cardinals Are Created At Historic Ceremony

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John has reinforced the august College of Cardinals with 23 new members, the first in 100 years. The pontiff, addressing assembled cardinals in Latin, also made a major attack of the "sorrows and bitter spectacle" of persecution of Catholics in Communist China. He cited attempts to divide the church, and said some who are "weak, wavering, frightened" have paved the way for a schism.

He called on them to stand firm.

ITALIANS PREDOMINATE
Dressed in scarlet and white robes of state, the Pope elevated prelates from nine countries to the princely rank. Ten were non-Italians and 13 Italians, bringing non-Italian membership to 45. North American representation was increased by two new cardinals from the United States.

Cardinals listened in silence around his throne as Pope John, only 41 days after his coronation, spoke on the need for enlarging the college and on the state of the church in the world, particularly in China.

There, he said, "the missionaries, preachers of the Christian gospel of peace, among whom are archbishops and bishops, have been accused of false crimes, thrown into prison and finally sent into forced exile."

SAYS TORTURE USED
"With the pastors so removed or molested, why is it to be wondered at, if the flocks entrusted to their care are compelled by every kind of enticement, by threats and by physical and moral torture, to break with the Christian faith?"

"There have not been lacking, alas, there have not been lacking those who, more fearful of the earthly commands of man than of the most sacred judgments of God, have given way to the injunctions of their persecutors."

After referring to the 23 new cardinals, the Pope said: "There are many others whom we have in our mind and heart and whom we judge most worthy of the same honor, and whom we hope to honor at a future date with the same lofty dignity."

BROKE PRECEDENT
Already by this consistory he swept away a precedent established by Pope Sixtus V in 1586, setting the college's number at 70. Only five years ago Pope XII had raised it to the full 70 for the first time in 200 years.

Scene of Monday morning's ceremony was the Consistorial Hall in the Vatican Palace.

The new cardinals were not there.

Officially they were not of princely rank until the Pope asked the college "Quid vobis videtur?" (what is your opinion?), and the old cardinals, 15 Italians and eight from abroad, arose and doffed their zucchetos, or skull caps, in silent assent.

When the 55-minute ceremony was over, special messengers went out to deliver the notices of appointment to the new cardinals, waiting in their chosen "throne rooms" in Vatican City and Rome.

On the communion table were the four candles of Faith, Hope, Love and Peace. These were lighted in traditional ceremony by John MacPherson, Joan Willis, Reg Johnston and Myrna Caswell. Following this each member of the group lit a candle from the four central lights.

Rev. Mr. Latimer delivered the message on the meaning of the Christmas and the lights of the tree. The recessional hymn was "O Little Town of Bethlehem."

Christian Group Holds Service At Riverside

City Man Draws Two-Year Suspended Term In Theft

A young Charlottetown man, John Herbert Shepherd, drew a two-year suspended sentence when he appeared for sentence on a theft charge before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet in County Magistrate's Court Monday morning.

The accused earlier pleaded guilty to the theft of 126 50-pound bags of potatoes from the warehouse of the Gulf Potato Company at New Wiltshire.

Defence counsel R.R. Bell Q.C., requested the suspended sentence for his client. He said it was Shepherd's first appearance in a court on any charge. Shepherd was released on a \$1,000 peace bond with one surety.

The defence for a Hunter River firm charged under the Game Act with allowing sawdust to escape into a stream frequented by trout was completed.

R.R. Bell, Q.C., appearing for the defence, asked for dismissal of the case on the grounds that it is a matter for federal prosecution and does not come within the jurisdiction of the provincial government.

The case for the prosecution will be given by crown prosecutor J.P. Nicholson at the next hearing scheduled for Monday December 22nd.

The case of a North Rustico man charged with break and entry was adjourned to Monday, December 22nd after evidence for the crown and defence was completed.

The accused is charged with break and entry into the basement of a store owned by Alyre M. Gallant of North Rustico on November 28th. He pleaded not guilty to the charge.

Evidence was given for the crown by Constable Albert R. Fischl of the Charlottetown Detachment of the R.C.M.P. The accused appeared on his own behalf.

The case adjourned after examination by the defence counsel Mr. Bell. The hearing is expected to be completed after crown prosecutor J.P. Nicholson's cross-examination of the witness Monday.



TRANSFERRED
Major Gordon E. Alaska Is Topic Of Study At Trinity Church W.M.S.

The W.M.S. of Trinity Church, Charlottetown, met in the West Parlor, Heartz Memorial Hall Monday evening, December 1, with a good attendance.

Miss Lymie Aitken and Miss Alice Fraser were in charge of the Worship Service and the Study period. The meeting opened with the hymn "Christ for the World" we sing, followed by reading from Matthew 28: 16-20, and a helpful commentary on the passage read, after which Miss Aitken led in prayer. The offering was received and dedicated.

The topic of study was Alaska, that great Northern land which the United States purchased from Russia in 1876 for the sum of \$7,200,000. Mrs. Allan Martin, Miss Florence Dollar and Mrs. E.M. Wheatley assisted in the study period, telling of the work accomplished in Alaska by missionaries of the different Protestant churches.

Mrs. Martin reviewed the work of the Presbyterian church, Miss Dollar the Protestant Episcopal, and Mrs. Wheatley the Methodist and Baptist churches. The missionaries travel by boats, station wagons, or planes, as some sections are practically inaccessible for ordinary travel.

Miss Fraser summed up:—In 1957 representatives of the different churches met in Fairbanks and planned a system of co-operation in their missionary work. This great land holds promise as one of the strongholds of Protestantism. The main problems are the transiency of the people, many of them belonging to the army, and the scarcity of suitable buildings. There is a need for new buildings and educational institutions.
