JOHN'S PRICES.—The Telegraph reports the following were some of the prices in St. John: Country beef, 3c to 6c per pound; butcher's beef, 5 to 7c; pork, 6 to 6 1/2c; ducks, 8c to 1 1/2 per pair; chickens, 40c to 50c; butter, 20c to 22c per lb; eggs, 28c to 30c per doz; potatoes, \$1.25 to \$1.40 per barrel; turnips, 60c per barrel; celery, 75c to 90c per dozen bunches.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

England and Portugal.

LISBON, Jan. 8. Senor Gomez will answer the Marquis of Salisbury's latest note at the end of the week. Salisbury's note was of a menacing, peremptory character, requiring Portugal to act at once as if the rectitude of England's position in the case was beyond all doubt. It is believed that Portugal cannot concede so much, but the foreign minister will intimate the willingness of the Portuguese government to order the maintenance of statu quo in Africa pending negotiations. If England will do the same, the main point of the Portuguese answer will meet part, at least, of the terms of Salisbury's demand, which was that the Portuguese government should immediately give to its agents such instructions as would prevent the repetition by Serpa Pinto, or by any other acts similar to those attributed to Serpa Pinto, as otherwise tranquil diplomatic discussion would be impossible.

Destroyed By Fire.

LEWISTON, Me., Jan. 7. The Lewiston City Building was totally destroyed by fire this evening. The fire caught in the Elevator shaft. It was a high brick structure and the most commodious city hall in Maine. It contained the city offices, the armories of the military organizations and the post office. The building was erected ten years ago at a cost of \$250,000. No insurance. The library of the Manufacturers and Mechanics Association, 11,000 volumes, was totally destroyed. Loss \$15,000, insured for \$6,000. The city records are supposed to be safe in the vaults. All of the mails and most of the Government property was saved. Tracey's Block was ruined, the inmates losing much of their property. The Androscoogin Poultry Show opened to-day in the building, and most of the fowls were burned. The loss on Tracy's block is \$2000.

The Quebec Legislature.

QUEBEC, Jan. 7. The Legislature opened for the despatch of business to-day. The speech from the throne congratulates the Province upon the satisfactory settlement of the Jesuits Estates question and promises measures increasing the membership of the Legislative Assembly, for abolishing the toll-gate and for establishing a permanent actual exhibition in Montreal. The public accounts of the Province for the last fiscal year show a considerable excess of revenue and expenditure. Bills to reform the jury system, promote colonization and encourage agricultural farms are also promised.

Diphtheria's Ravages.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., Jan. 7. The physicians who were sent by the county into the mountain districts along the Cheat River, in which diphtheria was reported epidemic, tell horrible stories of the sufferings of the people now afflicted with the disease of diphtheria and the more dreaded black tongue. The latter has broken out in the last two weeks and about 30 deaths have occurred.

A Good Showing.

OTTAWA, Jan. 7. The advance tables of Customs returns of last year show a total Customs revenue of \$24,000,000, of which Nova Scotia collected \$2,369,000; New Brunswick, \$1,538,000; P. E. Island, \$188,000; Quebec, \$10,569,000; Ontario, \$7,834,000; British Columbia, \$1,000,000; Manitoba and the Territories, \$580,000.

Why She Resigned.

OTTAWA, Jan. 7. Lady Stanley of Preston, has resigned her position as president of the Ministering Children's League, because of the determination of the Anglican members of the League to make it a denominational institution. Lady Stanley contended that such charities should be under non-sectarian management.

More Fighting.

BERLIN, Dec. 7. The Tagblatt states that the victory of Major Wissman over the insurgents near Soudani reported yesterday was complete. The paper says that the Arabs, after being driven from their fortified position returned and assumed the offensive and the Germans at Soudani are firing upon them.

More Medals.

OTTAWA, Jan. 7. The Minister of Marine has awarded a gold watch each to three fishermen of Bristol, Me., for special bravery in rescuing five of the crew of the Ocean Belle, of Digby, which was wrecked in November last, on the Maine Coast.

The Deadly Influenza.

BERLIN, Jan. 7. The Dowager Empress Augusta is suffering from influenza. She has had a relapse and her condition is critical. LATER.—Dowager Empress Augusta died at 4.30 this afternoon.

Mayors Elected.

TORONTO, Jan. 7. Mayor Clarke was elected by 2000 majority. In Kingston, Mayor Brennan was elected by acclamation and McLellan was successful in Hamilton.

Obituary.

OTTAWA, Jan. 7. Samuel Keefer, one of the oldest and best known Civil Engineers in Canada died to-day at Brockville.
