**THE DAYS OF PROPHECY.**—Considerable  
 excitement was caused at Sydney Mines on  
 Saturday last, owing to the fact that some  
 250 men (over half of the miners en-  
 gaged in the pit), refusing to work. It  
 appears, a few years ago an old lady pre-  
 dicted a terrible explosion in the pit on  
 Saturday. She first predicted that a boy  
 would meet with an accident in the pit  
 which would be followed a few days later  
 by the death of a man, then a white horse  
 would be killed, three days later the  
 big explosion was to take place. Strange  
 to say, all the predictions, save the explo-  
 sion, were verified. This old lady was  
 credited with having predicted the fatal dis-  
 aster which occurred in the Springhill  
 mines. This was doubtless the cause of  
 the superstition men fearing also the  
 materialization of her prediction in the  
 pit at Sydney Mines, refusing to work.—  
 North Sydney Herald.

**WEATHER PREDICTIONS.**—Those who  
 complain that winter has been linger-  
 ing too long in the lap of spring will be  
 interested in the predictions of a man  
 named Bonzy, in the State of Maine. Mr.  
 Bonzy, who is 86 years of age, has attained  
 a wide reputation as a weather prognos-  
 ticator and is out with some new and  
 startling predictions for the summer and  
 fall trade. Spring will advance rapidly,  
 he says, until the middle of April. "Then  
 there will be cold, dry weather with high  
 winds for two months and a half, causing  
 a failure of the hay crop. On June 23, the  
 longest day in the year, a heavy frost will  
 occur in New England, and the tops of  
 hills will be clad in snow. Memorial Day  
 will be cloudy and moist, and July 4 will  
 be so cold that men will need over-  
 coats and gloves. Early in August a  
 series of tornadoes and thunder squalls  
 will occur in Maine. Floods and tempests  
 mingled with lightning and hail will pre-  
 val until late in August, after which a  
 mellow autumn will come early and stay  
 long." There is however, some consolation  
 in the fact that the most successful of  
 weather prophets are sometimes wide of  
 the mark.

**Horrors of Famines.**

St. PETERSBURG, March 27.—The  
 newspapers of the city publish pitiable  
 accounts of the condition of the so-called  
 famine districts of Russia, especially  
 Samara, in the eastern part of European  
 Russia. The efforts of the Red Cross  
 Society have staved off the horrors of ac-  
 tual starvation, but the funds are almost  
 exhausted, and the distress, compelling  
 consumption of garbage of all kinds, has  
 produced an epidemic of terrible mortality  
 with typhoid, typhus, scurvy and other  
 pestilential diseases. The peasants are  
 compelled to sell everything, and many of  
 them sleep out in the cold, and as they are  
 weakened by hunger, they fall ready  
 victims to typhus and acute scurvy, and  
 unless the government gives prompt aid  
 the Volga provinces appear doomed to a  
 repetition of the horrors of 1891-1894.

**Beards or Clean Shaven.**

BERLIN, March 27.—The Vorwarts  
 says that the admiralty has issued an  
 order saying that the emperor is opposed  
 to naval officers or men wearing mous-  
 taches only, and in consequence they must  
 either be clean shaven or grow full beards.  
 This, the paper says, is a flattering imi-  
 tation of the custom carried out in the  
 British navy.
