Laotians are a happy people who have always met their problems with a shrug. Their favorite saying is "who cares?" Visitors and missionaries have known them as a cheerful, polite people who have easily resisted attempts to make them take life more seriously. Who cares, they ask. To do more work than necessary to keep food in their mouths and roofs over their heads in the rainy season has been considered impolite.

The Liberal party won only seven, compared with 26 before the election. One seat still is to be decided by a recount.

Premier-elect Walter R. Shaw and his cabinet will be swept left only one Liberal government in Canada - in Newfoundland, where Premier Joseph Smallwood was re-elected recently.

Five of the nine Liberal cabinet ministers were defeated. Re-elected were outgoing Premier Alex Matheson, Health Minister Dr. M. Lorne Bonnell and J. George MacKay, public works and highways. J. Douglas MacKinnon, former industry and fisheries minister, resigned after the legislature was dissolved.

Then Communist-led rebels fought a small-scale fight against the government. At first the rebel bands were made up of less than a dozen men, and despite ominous reports by the government it was hard to take the situation seriously. Laotians continued to tend their rice and opium crops.

Then rebel activity rose. The government said 3,500 troops from neighboring Communist North Viet Nam invaded. It called at week's end for United Nations troops to help repel the invaders.

School teachers were given machine-guns. Paddy fields were dotted with parachutes as the government dropped arms to its scattered forces.

And so power politics has answered the eternal question of the Laotians.

Now they all care.

**SUCCESS STORY**  
President Eisenhower relaxed in a 16-room apartment in a Scottish castle, catching up on his sleep and golf after his critical meetings in Bonn, London and Paris.

Observers agreed that Eisenhower, riding high in popular sentiment as a wartime hero, accomplished the chief aim of his visit - to iron out the biggest causes of suspicion and mistrust among the Western big three.

Although many problems remain, the West is closer together than it has been for a long time, with more mutual understanding, observers said - a vital factor that will give Eisenhower a stronger stand in his forthcoming exchange of visits with Soviet Premier Khrushchev.

**BORDERLINE DISPUTE**  
India's battle with Communist China over disputed borders between the two great Asian countries continued.

While promising firmly to maintain India's claim to border points taken over by Communist Chinese troops, Prime Minister Nehru sought to cool the dispute well below the ignition point by saying India will "always keep the door open to compromise."

He said India, while holding to the general line of the disputed border, is ready to accept arbitration by any party over minor interpretations of where the line should run.

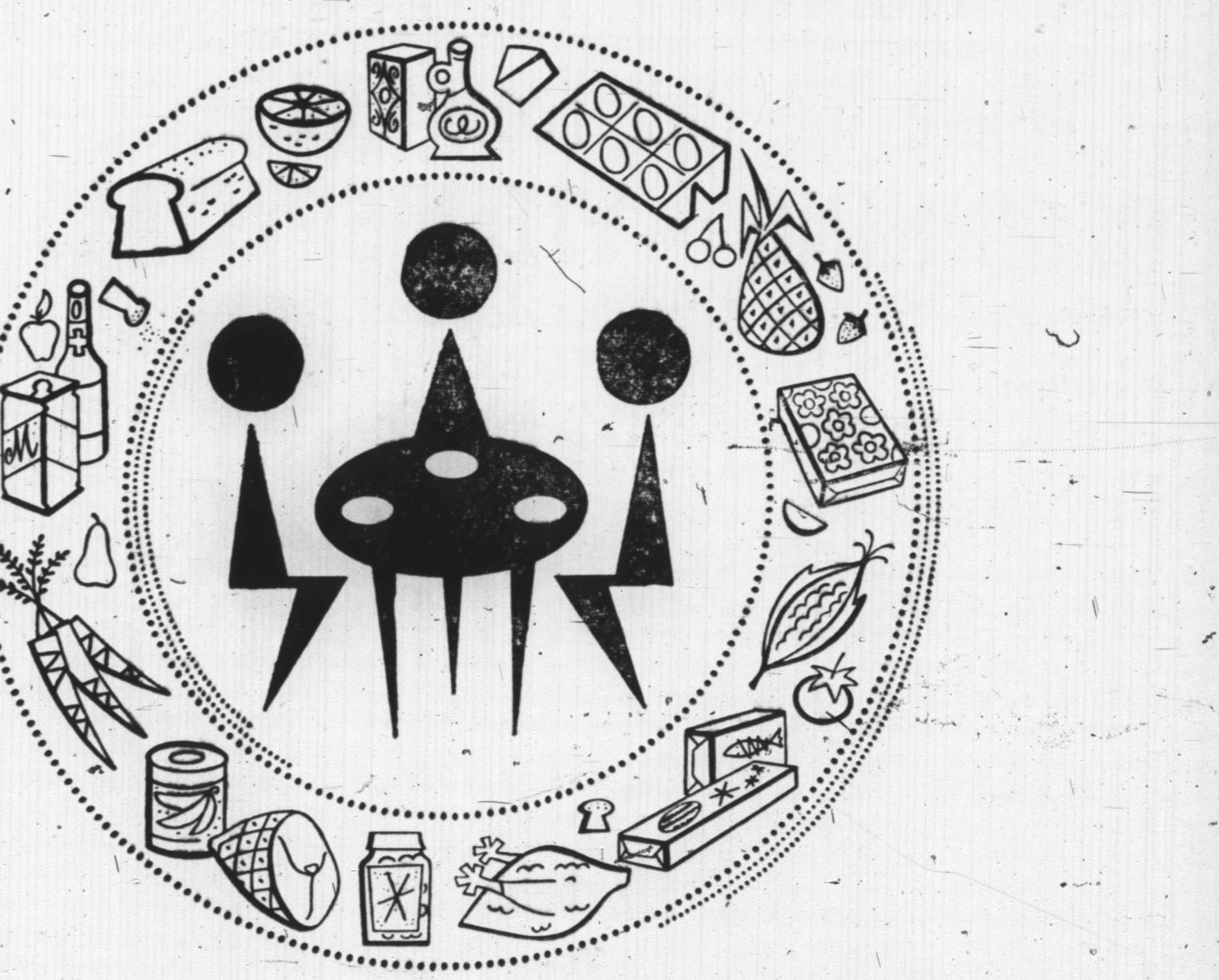
