

War Memorial Unveiled By Duke Of Edinburgh

YORK, England (CP)—The Duke of Edinburgh unveiled Tuesday a banking memorial commemorating more than 18,000 airmen, including 5,772 Canadians, who lost their lives in the Second World War while operating from airfields in northeast England.

Canada was well represented in the packed York Minster whose twin towers served as a familiar landmark to the men of No. 6 RCAF Bomber Group and other fliers operating in the area.

The men remembered here flew from airfields in this neighborhood, but they came from homes in many parts of the world," the Duke said.

A congregation of more than 4,000 watched in reverent silence throughout the ceremony. The memorial, erected in a chantry in the north transept of the cathedral, takes the form of an astronomical clock, showing the phases of the moon and the solstice and embodying the signs of the zodiac. The elaborate monumental framework enshrining the clock is of solid walnut, unpainted so that it may darken with the years.

In a signal tribute to the war-torn and sacrifice of the thousands of Canadians who served in the area, the honor of carrying and presenting the book of remembrance was given to Wing Cmdr. H. B. Hay of Edmonton, N. B.

Hay, a wartime observer and pilot, later headed the RCAF school of aviation medicine at Toronto an-

now is attached to the Canadian joint staff, London.

The 35-pound book of remembrance is placed on a lectern beneath the clock. Inscribed on its pages are the names of Australian, Canadian, New Zealand, South African, United Kingdom, Norwegian, French, Polish, Belgian, Dutch, Czechoslovak, Indian and Danish airmen.

During the service, the Queen's husband read part of Pericles' funeral oration on the young Athenians who had fallen in action during the first year of a Peloponnesian war.

"A small war but a great tribute," he said. "May I recall some of his sentences as the historian of Thucydides reported them, and let each as he listens substitute for the beloved city of Athens his own beloved country."

High Commissioner Norman A. Robertson and Air Commodore A.D. Ross, air member of the Canadian joint staff, headed the official Canadian delegation.

Others included Air Vice-Marshal C. M. Black, Mike McEwen of Montreal and G. F. Brooks, Digby, N. S., both former air officers commanding No. 6 group. Brooks is chairman of the York Minster memorial fund in Canada.

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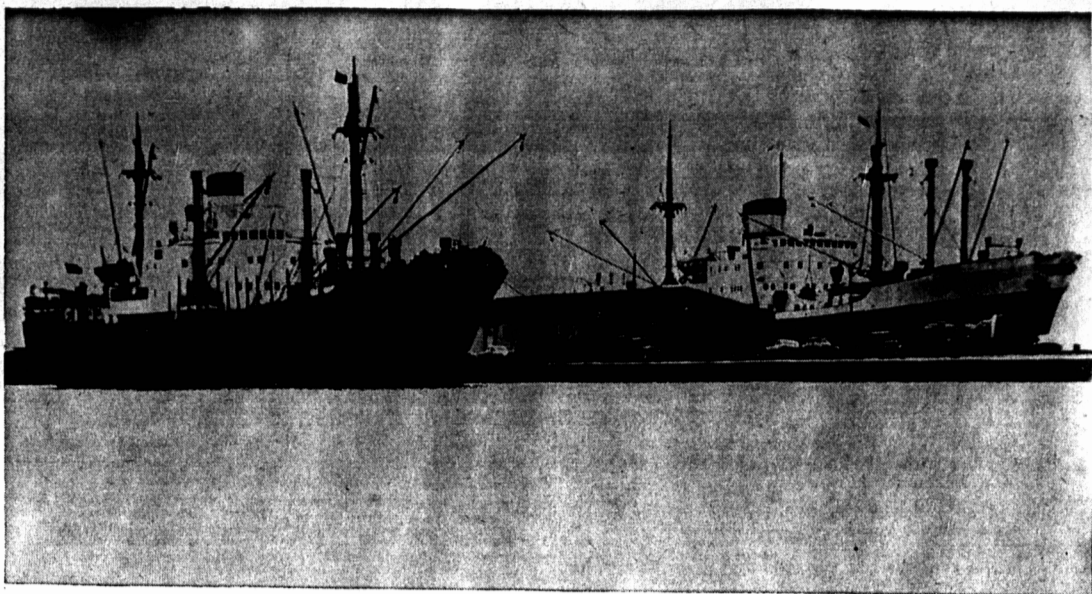
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TWO FREIGHTERS LOADING AT SUMMERSIDE

Record Increase In Gross National Product

OTTAWA (CP)—Federal economists now estimate Canada's gross national product-value of goods and services produced will rise this year to a record of \$26,250,000,000.

If realized, this would be \$1,000,000,000 higher than forecast and \$2,250,000,000 higher than actual production last year.

Further, they forecast-and this likely will be touched on by Trade Minister Howe in his annual year-end statement next month - that the momentum of Canada's economic expansion will be carried into 1956 and that production will make a further rise in that year.

The gross national product is one of the key indicators of the country's economic strength and reflects a degree of prosperity expressed in cash and goods on shelves.

Howe Is Reluctant To Use Emergency Powers

OTTAWA (CP)—Defence Production Minister Howe says he's reluctant to use the wide emergency powers he was granted at the last session of parliament following a month-long battle with the Progressive Conservative opposition.

He made the statement in a letter read Tuesday at Ottawa board of control replying to a city request for help in obtaining structural steel for a new police station. The board complained that a steel shortage is holding up work on the building.

Mr. Howe said the government is not allocating steel. The steel industry was arranging its own allocations and doing perhaps a better job than the government could do.

"You may recall that a bill giving me authority to allocate materials received a very rough passage in parliament at the last session," he said.

"For that reason I am reluctant to use the powers conferred in the bill until it becomes absolutely necessary that I do so."
