### CURE CATTLE IMPORTS

MELBOURNE, Australia (CP)—Australia has severely curtailed imports of United States cattle because of fear of the "blue tongue" virus, a disease which afflicts sheep but is carried by cattle. The health ministry said cattle would be permitted from the United States only from February to June, and only from six east coast U. S. ports.
