three some four and some seven years. It has been shown recently that the seven year rotation has been the best. Such a rotation could consist of turnips, wheat, clover, timothy, pasture (fertilized), pasture (fertilized) and oats. Mr. Dewar was of the opinion that to get the most out of pasture grazing, the herd should be shifted from the original spring pasture to the after grass of land from which silage has been covered and later in the fall they can be shifted back to the original field, which in the meantime, has been manured or fertilized, preferably around the first or second week in July. Mr. Dewar made the observation that farmers would benefit from the practise of milking the cows earlier in the days of the year than the fall. He pointed out that a cow does not graze after dark and the more daylight time they can get after milking, the better the milk production.
