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Gives Report On Visit To Sweden



Miss Suzanne Francis (above) in making a report to the Council of the P. E. I. Division of the Red Cross on her attendance at the International Junior Red Cross study centre at Sweden last summer, traced the activities of the six Canadian delegates throughout, and expressed her deep appreciation at being accorded the privilege and distinction of being present.

Following a course of intensified training at the Atlantic Training Centre at Acadia University, Wolfville, the party proceeded to Quebec where they were joined by Dr. Muriel Uprichard, Director of Junior Red Cross for Canada. Following entertainment by the Quebec Red Cross, the party embarked on the M-S Atlantic for Southampton, where they were met by Miss Heeman, Assistant National Director of J.R.C. for Canada who accompanied the party during the rest of the trip.

Following a sight seeing trip of three days in London, the party flew to Copenhagen, and then to Flamsliatt, Sweden, where the study centre is located. The 102 delegates from Great Britain, Ireland, France, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Finland, Germany, the Netherlands, Belgium, Canada and the United States were assembled to promote international friendship and understanding and to learn how the J.R.C. is organized and conducted in the different countries represented.

Miss Francis described in detail the daily studies and recreational activities which permitted a close association among the representatives on a high school level.

On the return trip, the representatives visited Stockholm, Copenhagen and the League of Red Cross Societies in Geneva. Mr. Henry Dunning, executive secretary, extended to the Canadian delegation personally, the thanks of the League for the splendid contribution of clothing, food etc., which is received from Red Cross House in Canada. The party also visited Gastaad, high up in the Alps where a home for children of T.B. families is maintained. A sail on Lake Geneva was a very enjoyable experience.

The delegates were then taken to Paris where they were entertained by the Parisian Red Cross for three days previous to embarking at La Havre for Halifax.

The experience gained at attendance at the International Training Centre was very much worth while and one which I appreciate very much," Miss Francis said. "It not only gave me a better understanding of the problems of each of the groups represented but also a wider knowledge of the enormous power for good an organization like the Red Cross can be. I hope that at some future time other juniors from the Island will be privileged to represent the Canadian J.R.C. at a similar Study Centre."

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NATIONAL DIRECTOR REVIEWS JUNIOR RED CROSS ACTIVITIES

"While young volunteers in Red Cross work are not so wise as the older folk, there is a growing need for their youthful energy," Dr. Muriel Uprichard, National Director of Junior Red Cross told members of The P. E. Island Divisional Council in an address yesterday at Red Cross Headquarters in Charlottetown. Dr. Uprichard was stressing the need throughout Canada for more Junior Red Cross activity at the High School level.

In the field of social responsibility there is a desire that the Government should do everything. "We forget we are the Government and the pupils should be encouraged to see the problems and try to meet them." In this there is a tremendous challenge for the young in High Schools," Dr. Uprichard said.

Qualities of leadership are being developed through the activities of the Junior Red Cross which are showing a marked effect on this country. "Training in citizenship, good will and service as well as health promotion, are highlights in the objectives of the Red Cross in the new program at High School level," the speaker said.

Forty-four countries are on the tape recording exchange circuits in which school music, national songs and folk songs are exchanged.

Dr. Uprichard touched on the barriers of language as experienced at the International study centre. Several provinces will have leadership training centres next year and at Queen's University there will be a National Training Centre.

"Despite the barrier of language, the young folk of all the nations taking part, appreciate the desires and wants of each other and we should try more and more to promote the exchange of views among young people," Dr. Uprichard said.

On concluding her interesting and thought provoking address, the speaker, who had been introduced by Dr. Lloyd Shaw, was thanked on behalf of those present by Lt. Col. Leo F. MacDonald, President of the Red Cross Society who occupied the chair.

Miss B. Munroe submitted the report of the Women's Work Committee which indicated that 4,212 articles of clothing for children up to eight years of age were completed during the season by different groups throughout the province, mostly Women's Institutes. Eight cases of these were shipped to the League of Red Cross Societies at Geneva, replacing some of the 51 cases loaned there to Pakistan at the time of the severe floods in that country. The other four cases have just been shipped to Mexico.

F. A. Large, Q.C., for Blood Donors committee, reported a serious shortage in the contributions required to keep up the recognized quota. "We have had three clinics and are going to have a fourth in Charlottetown for which an objective of six hundred has been agreed to," Mr. Large said. "We are overdrawn 857 bottles at the blood bank in Halifax this year and must endeavour to improve the situation promptly."

When used in other cities these tickets have had the effect of creating a very warm feeling in the tourist for the city he or she was visiting.
