Harbor Open, Potato Ship Coast May Load

Charlottetown harbor is open and there is a possibility that a ship may come in yet for potatoes, it was learned yesterday from E. K. MacNutt, district marine agent, department of transport who said it is unusually late for the harbor to be open, although there have been some years when it was open later.

Stone Face, Coat-of-Arms To Be Saved

The stone face of John Cabot and a stone bearing a coat of arms will be saved when the Cabot Building is demolished to clear the site for the Confederation Memorial Building.

TO LECTURE IN SOUTH KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—Dr. A. M. Koppel-Jones, professor of history at Queen's University, has been appointed to the W. K. Boyd Chair at Duke University in Durham, N.C. The prominent historian came to Queen's from the University of Natal in 1959 in protest against South Africa's racial policies. He will be lecturing on Commonwealth affairs at the provincial government office building for the one semester.

There was no indication as to what will be done with the face of Cabot. The face is located near the roof above the Richmond Street entrance to the building.

A cabinet minister said yesterday that the coat-of-arms stone may be preserved in the construction of the new provincial government office building.

Kinsmen At Work On New Project

Members of the Charlottetown Kinsmen Club are hard at work these nights preparing the new senior citizens' recreation centre for its official opening in about six or eight weeks time.

Last night about 15 Kinsmen were at work and during the next few weeks at least four Kinsmen will be working each week night plastering, painting, floor sanding, replastering and generally house-cleaning the premises.

The new centre which will provide clubrooms for Charlottetown's senior citizens is located on the corner of Fitzroy and Queen streets.

City Police Court Deals With Seven

Six drunk and incapacitated formed the major part of city police court docket yesterday. Of these, Magistrate A.J. Haslam imposed fines of \$20 a day for four or 10 days on four; one pleaded not guilty and was remanded to Jan. 4, and another was jailed on a previous commitment.

Expropriation Is Planned

The Crown Building Corporation is preparing to expropriate two properties on the site of the proposed provincial government office building in the West Kent School area.

It was learned yesterday that the corporation's offer to purchase 17 properties on the site was accepted by 15 property owners. Corporation lawyers are now getting ready to proceed with the expropriation of the remaining two properties.

The corporation was set up at the last session of the legislature to handle details of the new building, construction of which is expected to begin in the spring.

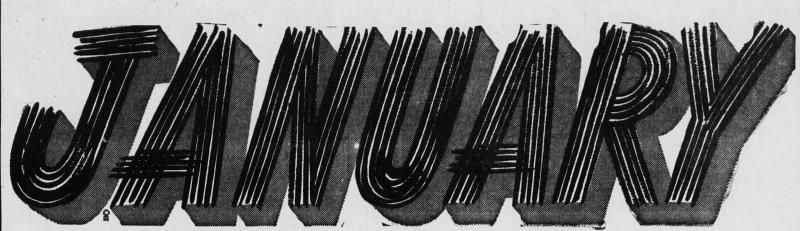

Widely Acclaimed Soprano Will Sing Monday At PWC

Tours that have spanned five continents have invariably brought most favorable comment on the performances of Lota Marshall, internationally known Canadian soprano, who will be heard here Monday at PWC.

Australians united in acclaiming and appreciating her unusual talent and the P.W.C. Sunday Times critic said "Lota Marshall is, to the best of my belief, the world's finest singer of dramatic songs. This is the same as saying the world's greatest soprano. Having heard the claimants to the title in Paris, Rome and London, I am almost sure she is."

The West Australian lauded her in 1957 "I am tempted to say ever heard here," and the Advertiser in Adelaide, Australia reported Miss Marshall's performance as "a phenomenonally perfect voice... in her singing we felt the touch of greatness."
