

Former Athlete Dies In Hospital

A former star as a participant and later as a coach and manager of athletic teams Jack Kane died yesterday in the Charlottetown Hospital.

The 52 year old former athlete died after an illness of some three months.

The late Mr. Kane came to the province in 1931 to perform with the Abbies of the old Big Four days. He had played previously with Hamilton Tigers who had gone on to capture the Allan Cup.

Jack played with the Abbies in the Maritime major loop right through until its dissolution in 1934. After that he performed with the locals in Charlottetown-Summerside competition. A real speed merchant on the ice lanes, Jack gave local fans many thrilling moments with his fine performances.

Rev. Swithun Bowers Is Keynote Speaker

Rev. Swithun Bowers, O.M.I., director of the University of Ottawa School of Social Welfare, St. Patrick's College, Ottawa, will be the keynote speaker at the Seventh Biennial Maritime Conference on Social Work, to be held in Charlottetown June 22nd, 23rd, 24th, and 25th.

Father Bowers who has held the above position since 1949, is a graduate (B.A.) of St. Patrick's College and of Columbia University (M.Sc.) At present he is vice-president of the Canadian Council on Social Work Education; a member of the executive board of the Ontario Welfare Council; a member of the co-ordinating committee, Social Work Education Curriculum Study, and of the curriculum committee, Council on Social Work Education as well as of the Minister's Advisory Committee on Child Welfare with the Ontario Department of Public Welfare.



FATHER BOWERS and has lectured extensively in Canada, the United States, Europe, Japan and in the Philippines.

In 1953, Father Bowers headed a United Nations mission to Belgium to aid in the improvement of teaching methods in the Belgian schools of social work. He has been a frequent contributor to social work literature.

A spray consisting of DDT 50 per cent wettable powder 2 lbs. per 100 gallons of water or DDT 25 per cent emulsion 1 quart per 100 gallons of water will control them. When the plants are small one nozzle per row is sufficient.

Inspector Warns Of Fire Hazards

One of the best known recipes for preventing the start and spread of fires is "plain ordinary good house keeping" City Fire Inspector Louis R. Ranahan pointed out yesterday when he noted that an unrealistic menace threatens many Charlottetown homes. The average home here, he explained, harbors a serious fire hazard, often without the residents giving it any serious thought, in the form of accumulated trash.

Trash piles, rubbish or stored odds and ends are where most fires start, he noted, with closets, attics and cellars being the principle places. "Rubbish stored in these places too often means the difference between a small controllable blaze and a fire-gutted home," he said.

He pointed out that only qualified mechanics should be trusted to install and service oil burning stoves and furnaces and that the users of such equipment should purchase only clean fuel as dirty oil is dangerous.

The principle fire hazards in the average home, the fire inspector said are, matches and careless smoking; defective heating apparatus; misuse of electricity; hot ashes carelessly disposed of; defective chimneys; ordinary kitchen hazards and mishandling of flammable liquids.
