OTTAWA—Nobody, not even the most optimistic Tory, had expected the Progressive Conservatives to sweep all four of last Monday's by-elections.

The fact that they did is generally interpreted, and I think rightly, as a gauge of the protest sentiment against the Government which is abroad in the country.

Protest against the high cost of living, restrictions on credit, cut-backs in housing, the \$65,000,000 wheat payment, and increases in taxes, mainly.

The P.C.'s, of course, would like to interpret their startling victory as a genuine swing towards their party and the things for which it stands. But that may be just wishful thinking—as it was in the case of the C.C.F. three years ago.

Oddly enough, the Conservative win on Monday makes a general election this summer more likely than even in Saskatchewan—a Province in which the P.C.'s are

practically non-existent. C.C.F. Premier T. C. Douglas has been testing the political air for months, seeking a propitious time to go to the country. The last provincial election was only three years ago, but Douglas is reported to favor holding one this year if the prospects for a C.C.F. win look bright.

The Liberals under Walter Tucker are the only opposition. And the buildup of protest in Saskatchewan against the Liberal Government at Ottawa, particularly over the "inadequacy" of the wheat payment is all grist to Douglas' mill.

To the C.C.F., the P.C. victories of Monday may be proof that the protest vote is ripe for a Socialist harvest. The Socialists hope to see this confirmed July 10, when they'll try to wrest the provincial riding of Gravelbourg from the Orits. If they succeed, then look for a general election there in September or October.

In Ontario, Walter Thomson is having the same kind of uphill fight against the P.C.'s that Tucker is having against the C.C.F. in Saskatchewan. The Ontario Liberal leader is trying to build an organization and line up candidates to sweep Premier Leslie Frost out of office, but Monday's results won't help.

The P.C. Government at Queen's Park hasn't faced the people in three years, and under ordinary circumstances would probably do so next year. But if the political weather looks too favorable now to wait, Frost may force Thomson to fight before he's ready.

The Provincial Liberals in Ontario have been short of strong candidates—cabinet timber—since the P.C.'s decimated them in 1943. Thomson needs such candidates and has asked Ottawa to provide them.

Immigration Minister Walter Harris was assigned the task of helping Thomson—whose selection as Ontario leader he once opposed—to persuade some Ontario Lib-

eral M.P.'s to resign from the House of Commons and seek election to the Legislature. As a result of Monday's P.C. victories, Harris and Thomson are likely to find they'll have to do a lot of talking to get anyone to give up a safe \$6,000 a year berth in Ottawa for a problematical \$8,000 a year portfolio at Queen's Park.

New Potato Variety Licensed

OTTAWA, June 30 — The new variety of potato -- Kennebec -- has now been licensed for sale in Canada and is therefore eligible for certification as seed.

W. N. Keenan, Chief, Division of Plant Protection, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, announced today that fields planted with this seed variety will be eligible for inspection this year provided that the quality of such seed is equal to Foundation or Foundation A class as defined in Canadian Regulations.

Originated by the United States Department of Agriculture at Beltsville, Maryland, in 1940, the new variety was selected from a late blight breeding program at Presque Isle, Maine, in 1941.

It is described as a vigorous, fast-growing, high-yielding, late-maturing variety, resistant to late blight, mild mosaic and net necrosis. Its smooth well-shaped tubers have shallow eyes and are more easily detached from the vines than those of Sebago.

Dr. E. V. Hardenburg, of Cornell, N. Y., reported that the variety gave the highest yield of any tested in 1947. Its cooking quality is good and it has excellent storage capacity. It is widely adapted to soil conditions and has been tested in many locations.
