

'65 Montague Council Has One New Member

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN

The Montague Town Council took the oath of office and allegiance before Judge J.S. DesRoches at Montague last evening prior to the regular monthly meeting. Mayor B.H. Yeo had appeared before Judge DesRoches previous to last night's meeting and was sworn.

The new council consists of P. Weston D. MacLure, Athol Robertson, Cameron Reid, Dr. A. E. Ings, John Hughes and Frank Greene. All except Robertson had served on previous councils. G. Arnold Wightman was re-appointed town clerk; James B. Johnston, Q.C. town magistrate.

H.M. Smith, George Gordon and David Bourke were named as possible assessors, two only to act. H.M. Smith is also to be approached and asked to act as auditor for the term.

Mayor Yeo appointed the following to serve on committees with the first named as chairman: finance, Hughes, Reid, Robertson; streets, Reid, MacLure; fire, Greene, Hughes, Robertson; police, Robertson, Hughes, Ings; building, town planning, street lights etc. MacLure, Robertson, Ings; tourism, sewer and water, sanitation, Ings, Greene, MacLure.

WELCOME EXTENDED

Mayor Yeo, in a few brief remarks, welcomed the new council and made a special mention of the new councillor Athol Robertson to whom he wished the best of luck. He said he always practiced economy and stated "if we work together for the town to the best of our ability we will be successful."

The town clerk explained the new bookkeeping system and introduced the council to the new set of books.

He also advised that the provincial government had surveyed the Montague bridge as a result of the letter written following the past meeting. A study is to be made to see what might be done to remedy the situation to the approaches.

He also read a letter from Hon. Andrew MacRae in answer to an inquiry by letter from the council with reference to the Sutherland dam project. Mr. MacRae advised that a simple by-pass dam would be constructed under the ARDA program early in 1965.

A letter of appreciation is to be written by the town clerk to Douglas McGowan, M.L.A. for his assistance and co-operation.

Mayor Leard then swore in councillors Walter Solomon, Andrew Meurant, Clarence MacDonald, Charles Gillis, Richard Power and Sterling Dingwell. Clarence MacDonald was appointed deputy mayor.

The following committees were appointed, with the first councillor of each as chairman: town properties, Clarence MacDonald and Sterling Dingwell; fire, Sterling Dingwell and Charles Gillis; finance, Clarence MacDonald and Ray Leard; town hall, Richard Power and Charles Gillis; water and sewage, Andrew Meurant and Sterling Dingwell; police, Charles Gillis and Ray Leard; building permits, Walter Solomon and Richard Power; streets, Andrew Meurant and Walter Solomon.

The following town employees were rehired: clerk, Mrs. Fee Roach; magistrate, William A. Reddin; auditor, Ralph Manning, C.A.; caretaker, Basil Lavie; jailer, Marcus Mooney; assessors, Michael MacInnis and C. Roy White.

It was decided to advertise for a town maintenance man, with tenders to close March 1. It was noted three applications have already been received.

One application was received from a town resident for a building permit for six cottages in the town. The request was referred to Claude Smith of the town planning board.

Newly-Sworn Town Council Considers Hike In Taxes

The move was made necessary by the heavy payments on sewage systems and disposal. A special meeting will be held Monday when the new budget will be presented.

Because of the line's proximity to the plant where line tension is higher and due to the wet weather the company opened the Weymouth Street circuit as a safety precaution.

Members of Alberton's new town council, elected by acclamation on nomination day, Jan. 18, were sworn into office last night by Mayor Roy Leard who was re-elected for his third two-year term.

Taking the oath were Charles Gordon, Arthur McRae and Frank McNeill, all members of the last council and Frank Weeks, a new member. Absent were Wesley Hardy, also a member of the last council and Raigh Callbeck, a new member with previous experience as a councillor.

Members of the last council who did not re-offer for election are John C. Profit and Walter Millman.

In a few brief remarks Mayor Leard extended a welcome to the old and new councillors and stressed the fact that all council meetings, held the second Monday in the month, are open to the public.

Arrears in town taxes are slightly over \$7,000 and action is to be taken to reduce this amount as soon as possible.

It was also noted that only \$240 has been received during the past year for rural fire protection services. When first introduced some years ago close to \$700 was received for out of town fire protection. The fire committee was asked to investigate the matter.
