Dr. Schweitzer, who is eminent as musician, philosopher, biographer and theologian, renounced fame and income in the middle of his European career to become a great surgeon and pre-eminent Christian missionary to the natives of equatorial Africa.

Mr. Gamble showed his listeners that through we shall never rise to such heights of service, we have our golden opportunities no less important, in the power and nature of our own words and influence on our neighbours and those we meet in everyday life.

Murder Charge To Follow Shooting

HAMILTON, (CP)—Lloyd Astley Webb, 30, will appear in court Monday on a murder charge arising from the shooting of a Belleville area woman with whom police said he has been living in a north-end apartment.

Police say Mary Carter, also 30, was shot between the eyes with a revolver early Saturday. She died later in hospital despite seven hours' work by surgeons to save her life.

Webb, who formerly lived in the West Indies, was taken to the police station for questioning. Later in the day, police charged him with murder.

Inspector of detectives Walter Hagan said Webb told him the couple left the apartment together Friday evening. Webb said he drove the woman to an east-end theatre and he himself went on to a home builders' exhibit. He said that when he returned at 2:55 a.m., he found the dying woman lying bleeding on the bed.

Says Montreal Not Bound By Decision

MONTREAL, (CP)—Judge Georges Robert has ruled that Montreal is not bound by a Supreme Court of Canada decision which gave Witnesses of Jehovah the right to distribute religious pamphlets in Quebec City without a police permit.

Judge Robert gave the decision Friday in ordering three men, charged with distributing circulars without a permit, to appear for trial May 27.

The Montreal executive committee, said the judge, had the power to govern the distribution of pamphlets. The crown, he continued, was not charging that the accused were Witnesses of Jehovah or that they were distributing religious material.

The Montreal by-law was different from the Quebec City one on which the Supreme Court judgement was based, he said.
