IN MEMORIAM

MR. WILLIAM BURLEIGH - There passed away on September 10th, Ellerslie's oldest and most highly esteemed resident, Mr. William Burleigh in his 86th year. Although bedfast for eleven months he bore his suffering with patience and Christian fortitude. His relatives and friends mourn his passing.

A gentleman, in every sense of the word, a friend to the poor and rich alike, a man of keen intellect and business ability, always ready to lend a helping hand to those who asked of him, seeking no praise or favors, he was a valued member and elder of the Bideford United Church in which he loved to worship on the Sabbath, until he was laid aside by illness. He was a strong supporter of the church and any worthy cause.

The funeral was held from his late residence on Saturday, September 13th, to the Bideford United Church and was attended by a large concourse of friends.

The service was conducted by Rev. A. J. MacDonald, assisted by Rev. R. H. Baxter of Hampton, P. E. Island, a former pastor, who preached the sermon and spoke very highly of the Christian life and character of Mr. Burleigh.

The hymns sung were, at the house, "Lead Kindly Light," at the church, "I'll Praise My Maker While I've Breath" and "The Lord's My Shepherd." Mr. Roy Phillips, who had charge of the burial, sang very effectively, "Face to Face," with Mrs. R. H. Logie at the organ.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. WATSON SILLIKER - A prominent and highly esteemed resident of O'Leary, Mr. Watson Silliker, 79, passed away on Monday September 15th in the Prince County Hospital, Summerside, after several major operations. He was known and beloved by young and old and his passing leaves a great void in the community life and church activities of O'Leary. He was a Deacon of the Knutsford Baptist Church for fifty years, and superintendent of the Sunday School for a number of years. He was a farmer and was also the Imperial Oil agent for twenty years, when he retired.

Mr. Silliker was always interested in all that pertained to the welfare of O'Leary and all that concerned the advancement and extension of the Christian Church. He was a humble and sincere follower of his Lord and Master. His life was a veritable benediction to all with whom he came in contact.

The funeral service was held on Thursday afternoon September 18th from the O'Leary United Church and was conducted by his minister Rev. C. O. Howlett. The spacious Church was packed to overflowing with extra seating provided, as hundreds turned out to pay their last respects to one who was so universally loved and respected.

The Scripture was read by Rev. W. G. Dickson and prayer was offered by Rev. J. M. Sheen. Favorite hymns of the deceased were sung "The Lord's My Shepherd," "We Meet Beyond the River," "In the Sweet By and By" and a fine duet "No Night There" was sung by Mrs. Leslie MacLean and Mr. J. B. Lewis. This number was especially requested by his daughter, Mrs. H. Clemons of Haverhill, Mass.

Mr. Silliker was twice married. Besides his sorrowing wife he leaves to mourn his loss the following daughters: (Iva) Mrs. Donald MacDonald, St. Eleanor's; (Luella) Mrs. H. Clemons, Haverhill, Mass. and the following sons: Lloyd and Lorne in O'Leary; Gordon, a veteran of World Wars one and two, Ottawa. Five children predeceased him.

The floral tributes were many and numerous, there being over fifty pieces of flowers. There were some twenty-five flower bearers. The pall bearers were Arnold MacDonald, Buddy MacDonald, James Cameron, Willard Smallman, Avard Harris, Guy Harris. Interment was in the Springfield West Baptist cemetery. "He being dead, yet speaketh", "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord."

IN MEMORIAM

EUGENE MACDONALD - The death of Eugene Macdonald, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Macdonald, Tignish, P.E.I., took place near the town of Mesford, Ontario.

This sudden, unexpected passing was due to a tragic highway accident on the morning of Saturday, September 6th. After the closing of Saint Dunstan's University in May, Eugene joined the R.C.A.F. School at Camp Borden. He was one of the twenty-one cadets returning to their training base in an army truck at 7.30 Saturday morning. They were sitting on the back of the truck on their kit-bags when the driver lost control of the vehicle and side-swiped some trees. A number of cadets were struck in the back of their heads and Eugene was one of the four killed instantly.

The telegram bearing the sad news of the accident reached his parents Saturday afternoon and as word spread through the village and in his many friends and acquaintances throughout the province, all experienced the shock and sorrow naturally attendant on the tragic death of a youth so full of life and promise. Eugene was but nineteen years of age; however, in these few short years, he had attained the fullness of time allotted him by God, and God took him to Himself in the beauty and freshness of his youth.

His was a truly beautiful character. All who knew him testify to the fact that he has left nothing but pleasant and happy memories in the wake of his nineteen years. Possessed of a gay, sunny disposition, Eugene was the life of the company whether at home, in school, in college or in training camp. As to the more serious aspects of his character, his sincerity, his high regard for, and fidelity to Christian principles won for him the esteem and respect of superiors and companions alike. Eugene's qualities were not the result of mere accident but the fruit of a well planned program of education - home and educational institutions admirably co-operating and supplementing each other.

At St. Peter's Lake, in St. Andrew's Parish, Eugene was born August 29, 1933. He received his early education at Vernon River and when the family moved to Tignish in 1947, Eugene enrolled as a student in the Convent-High School. There he graduated from Grade XI in June, 1949. September following found him in Saint Dunstan's University, which institution he attended till the closing in May 1952. For the vacation in the R.C.A.F. School at Camp Borden, from which he planned to return for his junior year at Saint Dunstan's.

However, God in His infinite wisdom had other plans for Eugene. The bereaved parents and family realize this truth and bear the weight of sorrow that fills their loving hearts with admirable Christian fortitude. Prayer, especially the many Mass offerings received for their dear boy, effects this salutary conformity to the all-wise will of God. On Monday, September 8th, before the remains left Camp Borden, Mass was celebrated with all the splendor of military services on such occasions. Through Wednesday evening until Friday morning, the body lay in the home of his parents. Troops of school children, intermingled their prayers with those of friends and relatives. They all knew Eugene, and he was the friend of all.

Besides his parents, there are left to mourn four sisters and two brothers: Majorie, a member of the teaching staff of Alberton High School, who is in sophomore year at Saint Dunstan's University; Ernestine and Eleanor, Joseph and Philip attending school in Tignish.

The funeral was held on September 12th at Saint Simon and Jude's Church, Tignish, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by the pastor, Reverend John A. McDonald, assisted by Reverend Father Ellsworth of St. Dunstan's University as deacon and Reverend L. B. Dooley as subdeacon. Reverend Claude Sheer acted as Thurifer and Reverend Phelan McKenna as master of ceremonies.

The following clergymen also were present: Rev. R. V. McKenna, rector of St. D. U.; Rev. Martin Monaghan; Rev. Father Ayward; Rev. M. J. Root; Rev. William Simpson; Rev. Joseph LeClair; Rev. W. D. McDonald; Rev. George McDonald; Rev. Parnell Wood; Rev. Terence Campbell.

The pallbearers were: Regis Duffy and Allan McDonald of Saint Dunstan's University; Joseph Kelly and Danny McInnis from Morell; Leonard Shea and Rodney McInnis from Tignish.

The funeral parade was comprised of members of the Tignish Canadian Legion led by Lt. M. O. Lane of Camp Borden, and his classmates of Saint Dunstan's University. Interment took place in the family plot in the church cemetery where services were conducted by Reverend R. V. McKenna, rector of Saint Dunstan's University.
