Marion Sullivan, Toronto, was found "not guilty" in an Ottawa assize court of manslaughter charge in connection with the death of her husband, Francis, Nov. 18, in an Ottawa hotel.

The twelve jurymen took four hours to reach their unanimous decision. Earlier in the day, before the jury retired, Chief Justice McRuer, who tried the case, fined the Ottawa Journal and two of its reporters \$3,600 for contempt.

Basis for the judgment was a news story speculation that Mrs. Sullivan might take the witness stand to tell her own story of events in a Chateau Laurier bedroom the night of Nov. 17, which, in the view of Justice McRuer, might have been harmful to trial proceedings, by its implication that all facts were not being revealed.

Reporters were fined \$300 each and the publisher, Grattan O'Leary, who apologized for appearance of the piece, was fined \$3,000.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JOHN FERGUSON

The death occurred at Beach Grove, Charlottetown, on Feb. 1st, 1951, of Mrs. John Ferguson, formerly Mary Caroline French, in her 84th year.

The deceased had enjoyed her usual good health until nine weeks previous to her passing when she developed pneumonia, from which she never fully recovered. She was the daughter of the late Isaac French and Annie Orr of New Glasgow, P.E.I.

The late Mrs. Ferguson was twice married, first to Edward Moore of Brookfield, who predeceased her 41 years ago. Of this union there were seven sons and one daughter who cherish the memory of a loving mother, namely: Nelson of Hunter River; Lem of Meadow Lake, Sask.; Reagh at Brookfield; Ethel (Mrs. Collins) of Boston, Mass.; Isaac of Rock Point, Sask.; Cecil and Richard of Matchee, Sask.; and David of Argyle Shore, P.E.I.

Six years later she married John Ferguson of Argyle Shore who predeceased her about five years ago. She also leaves to mourn her passing three brothers and two sisters, namely: Albert of Georgia; Leslie of Brookton, Mass.; Russell of Wiltman, Mass.; Ethel (Mrs. Cooper) of Brockton, Mass.; and Jennie (Mrs. MacNevin) of Argyle Shore; one brother Nelson predeceased her in his youth.

The funeral service which was largely attended was held from Brookfield Presbyterian Church at 2 p.m. on the 3rd of February, conducted by her pastor, Rev. Mr. Nicholson who had called on her several times during her illness, assisted by Rev. Mr. Richardson of New Glasgow Christian Church. Hymns sung were: "The Lord Is My Shepherd"; and "Shall We Gather At The River." Rev. Mr. Nicholson rendered beautifully a solo, "Abide With Me."

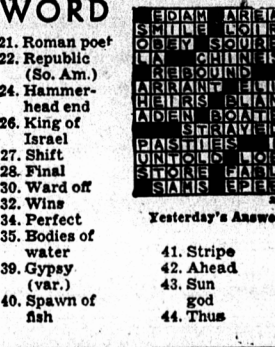
