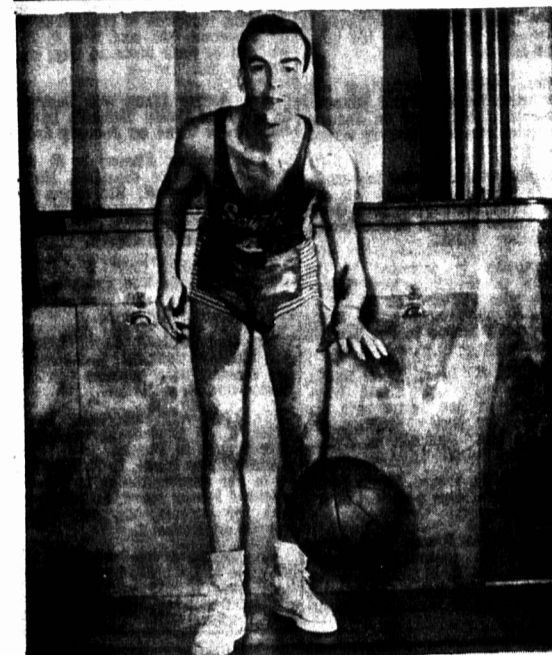

Awe-Inspiring 23-0 Victory

Detroit Red Wings Blank Chicago Black Hawks 7-0

CHICAGO (CP)—Goalie Glenn Hall notched his 10th National Hockey League shutout Friday night as Dutch Reibel, Metro Prystal and Ted Lindsay each scored two goals apiece in Detroit Red Wings' 7-0 blanking of Chicago Black Hawks. The victory was Detroit's ninth in their last 10 games and moved them to within 10 points of the league-leading Montreal Canadiens.

Lewis MacDonald Paces Win S.D.U. Defeats St. Thomas 3-1

St. Dunstan's University won their second consecutive intercollegiate hockey game when they shaved St. Thomas last night at Newcastle, N.B. by a 3-1 score. Big defenseman Lewis MacDonald led the Saints to victory figuring in on all three goals, and firing the opening corner himself in the first period. MacDonald was the only player to score in the second period that, at the time, gave S.D.U. a 2-0 lead. St. Thomas nipped one in the early minutes of the third period and then pressed hard until the last minute of play when they yanked their goaltender.

U. S. Advances To Tennis Finals

BRISBANE (AP)—America gained a place in the mixed double finals of the Australian tennis championships Friday but U.S. chances of winning the big singles title dimmed as Australian Lew Hoad put on one of his superb performances to complete the men's semifinals bracket. Herbie Flam of Beverly Hills, Calif., and his Australian partner, Mrs. Thelma Long, won their semifinal match from B. Bowman and Ann Sheldon 6-2, 7-5. But Flam, already in the men's semi-finals, wasn't optimistic after watching Hoad conquer Morvyn Rose 3-6, 6-1, 6-4, 6-2, 9-7 in a match postponed because of darkness Thursday after the first set. Gil Shea of Los Angeles, now out of all sections of the tournament, said Australia should be an odds-on favorite to retain the Davis Cup next winter. "Nobody overseas realizes how good the Australian younger brigade is on their own courts," Shea said.

Jr. Tennis Championships To Be Nation-wide Event

TORONTO (CP)—The Canadian curling team (tennis) championships will become a country-wide event for the first time next summer, it was announced Friday. Competitors will be assured from each province for the championships, to be played at Ottawa's Rideau Club Aug. 9-12. This year the championships, sanctioned by the Canadian Lawn Tennis Association, will be sponsored by Canada's Junior Chambers of Commerce and Junior Boards of Trade and the Toronto Globe and Mail. The first two groups will conduct regional and provincial tournaments which will help decide representatives for the Canadian finals. The Globe and Mail will pay expenses of three finalists from each province. Finalists will be decided in three classifications: boys 12 or under as of last Jan. 1 (juvenile); boys 14 or under and boys 17 and under (junior). Provincial tournaments to decide finalists will be held in Newfoundland July 27; Nova Scotia July 14-21; Quebec July 21-28; New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island July 23-27. Officials said schedules have been arranged so that east and west coast winners on their way to Ottawa for the finals may join in other provincial tournaments.

Two Hoop Tilts At P.W.C. Tonight

The undefeated Trotters meet the league's new entry the Atoms and the Aces play P.W.C. in City League basketball activity tonight at P.W.C. auditorium. The Atoms, who pulled an upset win over the Welshmen in their initial start last Monday, will be facing a real test when they grapple with the league-leading Trotters, who look to be from games already played, just about the hottest club in the circuit. The Aces and P.W.C. have met on only one other occasion that resulted in a victory for Aces. There has been a change of line for tonight's games. The first between the Welshmen and Aces will start at 6:45 and the second between Atoms and Trotters is slated to get underway at 8 p.m.

1400 Fans See Close Contest

The Montague Primroses outlasted the Summerside Aces at Civic Stadium last night before a bumper crowd of over 1,400 fans to squeeze out a 6-5 victory after the score had seen-sawed in favor of one team and then the other all evening. RABBIT SEASON
