FRANCE'S CRUSHING BURDEN

Staggers Under an Annual Weight of \$200,000,000 for Arm.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—A London despatch to an afternoon paper says: In France the question of taxes is becoming serious and the increasing amount levied on everything is one reason for the unrest and discontent there. France supports a fifth part of the entire military expenses of Europe. She staggers under the weight of \$200,000,000 annually, in the interest of her debt. Between that and the army she must pay \$400,000,000 before she can apply a cent to the vital interests of the state. The French colonial enterprises are immensely costly, being in outlandish and inaccessible regions, as productive of rebellion as they are unproductive of revenue. The civil service is overloaded with functionaries, and the government contracts are frequently but arrangements for corruption. A company which supplies the army, ran the price of its shares up from 128 to 164 in a few months. The navy is claimed to be unduly costly, and through the mismanagement ships are so long in building that they are obsolete when launched. The country districts form the only political group which consistently agitates for international reforms.

NEWS NOTES

The speech from the throne at the opening of the Ontario Legislature begins with a statement that the Government made a blunder in connection with the constables' vote session and that an irregular prorogation had to be ordered in consequence. The next section but one declares that the law, having been declared by the courts to be something that the Government did not think it was, the constables' vote session was unnecessary. The speech from the throne at the opening of the present Quebec session was counted one of the most extraordinary in the record. In another way this particular one of Ontario's will take place beside it. Liberal statesmanship has created a new interest in the constitutional utterances of Lieutenant-Governors. They may become popular literature yet.
