SALMON CREOLE

Brown 1 tbs. chopped onion in butter. Add 1 cup tomatoes, 1/2 tbs. green pepper and seasonings and cook 10 minutes. Pour creole sauce over one-half lb. flaked Todd's Salmon in a baking dish. Sprinkle with bread crumbs and bake in moderate oven 15 or 20 minutes. Serves 3.



SALMON PATTIES

Turn into a bowl two 1/2 lb. cans Todd's Salmon and its liquid. Flake fish and mash bones. Add 2 well-beaten eggs, 2 tbs. flour, 2 tbs. cream, 2 tsp. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. salt and few grains pepper. Combine lightly but completely. Tomato Sauce: Combine 1 cup canned tomatoes, 1 small slice onion, 1 whole clove and 1/2 bay leaf. Bring to boil, then sieve. Cream 1 tbs. butter in small saucepan and blend in 1 tbs. flour. Gradually stir in strained tomato mixture, cook, stirring constantly, until smooth. Serves 6.

New Housing Legislation Approved By Commons

OTTAWA, (CP) — The government's new housing legislation has passed the Commons. It now goes to the Senate for study.

The legislation Monday was given third reading on division—without a recorded vote—after the CCF attempted to set a fixed limit on the rate of interest on loans under the bill.

As the measure was called for final approval Joseph W. Noseworthy (CCF-York South) moved that it be referred back to committee so that a fixed limit could be inserted. His amendment was defeated by 142 to 35.

The Liberals and Progressive Conservatives, W. D. Wylie (SC-Medicine Hat); Paul Gagon (Ind-Chicoutimi) and Fernand Girard (Ind - Lapointe) opposed the amendment. It was supported by all other Social Credit members and the CCF.

Rate May Rise Mr. Noseworthy said outside the Commons that the CCF planned to propose that the limit should be 5 1/2 per cent, the current rate on loans under the National Housing Act.

legislation will be announced after the legislation has been proclaimed. It is speculated here that the rate will be 5 1/2 per cent. During debate preceding formal reading, Opposition speakers said the legislation did not go far enough. They also charged the government had exaggerated what the legislation would accomplish.

Works Minister Winters said the government opposed the amendment on grounds that the interest rate should be flexible. Approval of the amendment would extend the date the legislation would go into effect. Builders should be given full benefit of the legislation at the start of the spring construction season.

Opposition Leader Drew said the bill's provisions but felt the legislation should be approved without delay and that the government should have an opportunity to make it work.

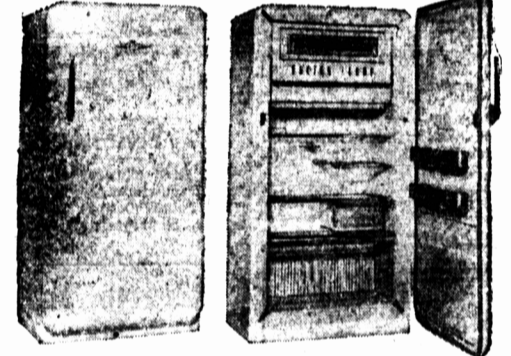

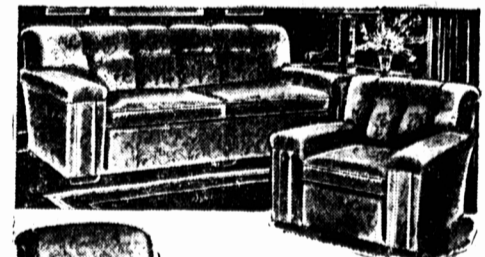

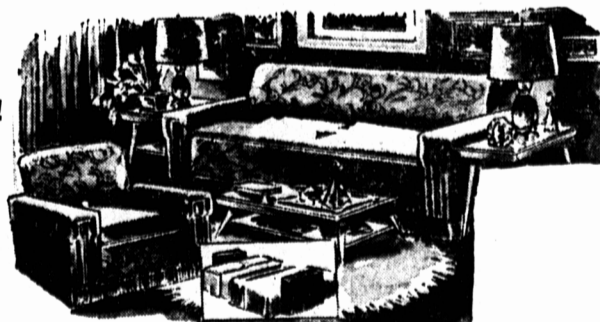
