

Breakfast Egg Less Popular But Price Boost Indicated

NIGHT LEAD CABINET—penalty for ARCH MacKENZIE. OTTAWA (CP)—The breakfast egg is on the skids. Federal agriculture department spokesmen suggest that the modern pro- packaged breakfast—especially cereals—is partly to blame. So are modern working housewives reluctant to grapple with the dishwashing created by eggs and bacon or eggs poached, scrambled or served as a omelette. Speed is another factor. The answer may be the good old-fashioned three-minute boiled egg—neat, tidy and lastingly satisfying. Federal egg consumption figures show a steady decline for Canadians over the last five years. In 1957, a peak rate of 23 dozen for every man, woman and child was achieved. The rate dropped to 24.2 dozen in 1958 and last year touched 22.5 dozen.

Naval Problems Are Discussed By Rear-Admiral

HALIFAX (CP)—Talk will not stop the navy's problems, rear-admiral Jeffrey Brook, Atlantic navy chief, said Wednesday. To those who heard him it sounded like a report to recent charges about the navy's "cock-and-bull" mind. The admiral spoke during a ceremony at nearby Shearwater naval air station inaugurating a new anti-submarine helicopter. He spoke on the role of the navy. His prepared speech dealt with the problems of anti-submarine warfare are many and varied but he departed from the text to say, "and they can't be solved by talk". He added that the solution requires a tremendous and continuing effort by military forces, civilian scientists and engineers and by industry.

140 Russian Fishing Vessels Reported Off Coast Of U.S.

HALIFAX (CP)—A concentration of about 140 Russian fishing vessels was reported Wednesday about 20 miles off the Nova Scotia's eastern shore about 80 miles east of a naval spokesman said the navy is aware of the concentration which he described as "fairly common." He said the navy presumed they were looking for fish, but was keeping an eye on them. They included a number of factory ships and trawlers. Sugar Prices Move Upward

MONTREAL (CP)—Three major sugar refineries Wednesday announced a 20-cent increase in the price of refined sugar, bringing it to \$10.80 a 100-pound bag. The price increase is the first since last June 21, when the price was \$14.80. Since that time the price has declined steadily. The price level is determined by the cost of raw sugar on the world market in London. The price has changed 61 times since Jan. 1—39 increases and 22 decreases. Last May 23 the price was the highest since 1929, \$17.65 a 100-pound bag. It was \$9.10 Jan. 1.

Heart Valve Transplant Success

LEEDS, England (Reuters)—Surgeons here have successfully transplanted a dead man's heart into the heart of a woman undergoing an operation, it was announced Wednesday. The woman's heart was stopped for three hours during the 12-hour operation, performed a week ago. After the operation the woman, 30-year-old Mrs. Violet Scott, was reported to be "doing fine". The operation was carried out at Leeds Infirmary, International-recognized centre for heart surgery, by a team of 20 surgeons, heart specialists, doctors and nurses. Mrs. Scott's heart now is beating normally again and she is expected to be discharged from the hospital shortly. The valve was discharged from the dead man with the permission of his relatives and was kept in deep freeze.
