Among The Farmers

Federation of Agriculture News

Roundup of Fall Work

Fine weather is making it possible for farmers to gather up the many odds and ends that are always present at this time of the year. The last of the turnips, a few rows of vegetables some winter apples, the last of the plowing, spreading of manure for next year's crop, are the order of the day.

Price Support Program

Up to March 31, 1950 the cost to the Dominion Government of price support amounted to slightly over eight million dollars. Of this amount approximately six million has been paid on apples and about one million eight hundred thousand in 1946 and 1948 for potatoes.

When we consider that at the present time Canadian consumers are buying potatoes very much below the cost of production and that with our economy in general at a very high level it would seem that the potato grower has a just cause for assistance.

Up to the present time there has been no official reaction from our Provincial Government in regard to the Dominion's proposition that the Province should assist in price support. Potato growers are very much interested and would like to see the situation clarified.

Maritime Winter Fair

Island farmers have good reason for satisfaction over their achievements at the Maritime Winter Fair. Island livestock breeders again showed that they could more than hold their own and the King's County potato growers were in a class by themselves.

We have always felt that Prince Edward Island farmers, given equal opportunities, could hold their own with the best in Canada in any field of endeavor.

Freight Assistance on Grain

The threat of cancellation of the Feed Grain Assistance Policy seems to have been averted for the present.

This does not mean, however, that the danger does not still exist. Farmers and their organization should be prepared to activate press for the permanent continuation of this policy.

We should not return to the condition which existed before 1940 when foreign producers were able to buy Western grains at lower prices than Maritime farmers.

Freight Rate Increases

The Canadian Federation of Agriculture is making preparation to present the case of Canadian livestock producers when the Board of Transport Commissioners meets to consider the question of increased freight rates on livestock.

The proposed increase, if allowed, would cost the Canadian livestock industry one million five hundred thousand dollars. Our farmers can rest assured that the Federation will do everything possible to protect their interests.

Fiftieth Anniversary

The first meeting of farm leaders to organize the Canadian Federation of Agriculture was held in Toronto in the fall of 1905.

During these fifteen years the C.F.A. has battled valiantly on behalf of the Canadian farmer and through a policy of reasonable and fair demands has won the confidence of Dominion and Provincial Governments and grown in the estimation of other classes of society in this country.

The C.F.A., while primarily concerned with the welfare of the farmers, has realized that the interest of the consumer must be kept in mind as well. Agriculture is definitely stronger and more prosperous due to the efforts of the C.F.A.

County Annual Meetings

The County annual meetings of the Federation of Agriculture to be held at O'Leary on the 14th, Charlottetown on the 15th and Miramichi on the 16th gives our farmers an opportunity of becoming better acquainted with their organization and to suggest a solution for the present day problems and ones which may arise in the future.

It takes faith to be a good farmer and those that look far enough into the future realize the necessity of a strong and active farm organization.

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Progress in Agriculture

In agriculture during the last decade there has been marked advancement in efficiency in many ways.

We have better animals and better crop varieties. We know more about how to take care of our soil and are doing more about it. We know more about how to use fertilizer, and have increased its use. We are doing a better job of controlling insects and diseases. We are making greater use of mechanical power to perform farm tasks easier and quicker and with less manpower. From a production standpoint progress has been significant.

The problem today is greater efficiency in marketing and the promotion of consumption of basic food products. Agriculture is beginning to realize the necessity of advertising and we are impressed with the four full pages of advertising in the "Life Magazine" of October 30th. This magazine has a circulation in excess of five million and now attending the International Co-operative College in England, remarks that the cost of living is lower than in Canada.

This is brought about by collecting a high purchase tax on luxuries and non-essential goods and subsidizing the prices of foods, utility clothing, etc. The consumer pays about 30 cents per pound for butter, 45 cents for bacon and up to 77 cents a dozen for eggs.

Cost of Living in England

A recent letter from L. P. Moisan, former secretary of the Federation and now attending the International Co-operative College in England, remarks that the cost of living is lower than in Canada.

This is brought about by collecting a high purchase tax on luxuries and non-essential goods and subsidizing the prices of foods, utility clothing, etc. The consumer pays about 30 cents per pound for butter, 45 cents for bacon and up to 77 cents a dozen for eggs.

A suit of good quality Scotch tweed can be bought for \$35.00. In that part of England the price of potatoes to the farmer is starting at 70 cents per bushel, but the average amount of fertilizer used is from 400 to 600 pounds per acre.

Farm Forum

At the County meetings of the Federation, Farm Forum members will have an opportunity of hearing Floyd Griesbach, National Farm Forum Secretary. Farm problems can be solved by study first followed by action. Again may be reminding all our members of these meetings and the importance of as many farmers as possible attending.
