NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Judging by the fuss they are making about him, the new Liberals wish sincerely that Hugh John had not come out to help Sir Charles in the coming contest.

—The St. John Sun reports that at Hillsboro the other day Mr. Emmerson took an affectionate leave of his Albert county constituents. He told them that he could go on the bench or could be a candidate in Westmorland, but did not say which he would take. The general impression is that he expects both.

—The Montreal Gazette remarks that "the financial accounts of the year ending with June 30th show that the custom and excise tax collections of the twelve months were \$33,242,223. This is \$10,482,938 more than was "wring" from the people in the Conservative year of 1896 but it does not seem to worry the Liberals so much. They had the spending of it.

—One effect of the dissolution of the British Parliament has been to elicit declarations from almost all the Liberal papers and politicians in favor of the policy of annexation in South Africa. The manifestoes of the party leaders have not yet appeared; but as soon as they do appear the speech-making will begin, and the campaign will go forward.

—An order-in-council has been passed authorizing the Militia Department to arrange for sleeping car accommodation for future returning soldiers from South Africa. Hitherto the men travelled as soldiers generally do, taking "pot luck," but the government has decided that better treatment should be accorded the others. An election is in prospect!

—The Mail and Empire remarks that when Sir Richard Cartwright stood up in Oxford county and abused Sir Charles Tupper, on the ground that none of his relatives had gone to the war, he either spoke in ignorance or with malice, for Sir Charles' grandson is fighting as a private. Such an attack was a small thing for a man of Sir Richard's pretensions. Mr Fitzpatrick has a much higher notion of fairness. During his speech on the contingents, Dr Landerkin, the Parliamentary interrupter, broke in with the funny remark that there was "no Tupper at the front," whereupon Mr. Fitzpatrick retorted that men could serve their country in public life as well as on the battle-field. Dr. Landerkin subsided under this rebuke, red from the crown of his head to his neck, and was not heard of again during the entire session.

—The Montreal Witness says: "It is seldom that there is such a wide-spread sense of loss associated with the death of a man in the prime of life as prevails in eastern Ontario and the Ottawa valley, and largely in Montreal, over the sudden ending of the earthly career of the Rev. John McLeod, of VanKleeck Hill, called directly by misadventure from the scene of those urgent activities in which he had shown himself to be a natural leader of men. Aided by no adventitious circumstances, his own nobility of personality was rapidly impressing itself on the community in such a way as to make men say that a thousand men could have been more easily spared than he. Not that he did anything ostentatious or out of the way. He simply and modestly, and with determination, took the right side in all things, and what lay next to hand he did well and truly. The best hope is that there is something in the fall of leaders to inspire others to step to the front by emulating their fortitude and faithfulness."

CANOE COVE BREAKWATER.

Sir.—It appears the unsound local Premier is very anxious about the Canoe Cove breakwater. Before the Douglas-Wise election two persons visited the locality and agreed to buy all the stone and wood owned by Mr. John McRae with a view to erecting the breakwater. Mr. McRae orders to remember the Doctor when the election came on. It appears that Neil Malcom McKenzie had a stone quarry which was in great demand by the machine agents. But both Mr. McRae and Mr. McKenzie were too intelligent to be bought by chaff. If this breakwater goes on doubtless the unsound Premier will utilize the streams where, we are assured, excellent fish can be caught, in order to start a hatchery for the propagation of fish. What is to be done? The Minister of Marine and Fisheries can send a special messenger with the necessary spawn, and Canoe Cove, when it receives its just reward, will boast of a breakwater and hatchery, a hotel for tourists to consume the food grown in that neighborhood. We have no doubt, whatever, that this intelligent community if they are true to themselves, will receive better treatment than has been meted out to them by the Minister of Marine and his doughty lieutenant, Mr. Farquharson. The people are sovereign, and will dictate their own terms to aspiring representatives; they will not accept stones for bread.

Conservative papers are coming to agree with Liberal papers also that choosing such candidates does no harm to the Liberal party. Mr. German and Mr. Pacaud are good enough supporters of Mr. Tarte, Mr. Sifton, Mr. Blair and Dr. Borden and the rations job.

INDEPENDENT ACTION.—An Ottawa despatch says: The Dominion Trades Congress by a vote of 15 to 22, today decided that the time for independent political action on the part of the trades unionists of Canada has come, and adopted a resolution to that effect.
