

Convictions Are Upheld In S' Side Appeal Cases

The appeal cases of William Harold Companion and Joseph William Leroy Perry of Summerside against convictions under the Excise Act were heard in special sitting of the Supreme Court, Summerside yesterday with the convictions being upheld and the sentences confirmed by Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan, who presided.

The two appellants were convicted in magistrate's court, Summerside on March 6th, 1956, of possession of a quantity of wash (170 gallons) for distillation purposes and this was seized by the R. C. M. P. on the night of December 18th, 1955.

Companion, because of a previous conviction, was sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$500, and costs by Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C. and in default of payment, to serve an additional six months in jail.

Perry was fined \$100.00 and costs or three months because it was his first conviction under the Excise Act.

D. O. Stewart Q.C. acted for the Crown and J. A. MacDonnell, Charlottetown for the appellants.

Dentist Has Word On Toothpastes

VANCOUVER (CP) — A United States dentist who says he brushes his own teeth with "water and a tooth brush" has hit at the "low ethics" of some toothpaste manufacturers.

Dr. David B. Law of the University of Washington's school of dentistry Wednesday said some manufacturers "claim toothpaste has fluoride but they don't say what kind of fluoride."

"Some toothpastes have sodium fluoride which has no value at all" in toothpaste, he told the British Columbia Dental Association.

He indicated it was a deliberate attempt to confuse their products with fluoridation of water, widely accepted as beneficial in preventing

Red Cross Work Reviewed At Alberton H.S. Meeting

A most interesting Red Cross programme was enjoyed by interested persons who assembled at Alberton High School Monday evening. The meeting was called in order by Mr. Winston Currie, chairman of the Alberton Disaster Services Committee. He introduced Rev. M.D. Dunbar of Charlottetown who presented colored film slides depicting Red Cross work in Korea last year. In introducing the slides Rev. Dunbar described the geographical position of Korea, the characteristics of her people, and the great need that had been brought about by war conditions.

The pictures included some small sections that had not been devastated by war, rice fields and vegetable gardens, method of washing and bleaching clothes, a leper colony, several temples.

Other pictures showed something of the result of war-modern buildings which appear to be in good condition but which are gutted by fire inside, North Korean refugees cleaning up rubble in preparation for reconstruction, parts of the city of Seoul where two million people are still living in war devastated conditions, a hospital packed with bullets and shrapnel, nurses who have only one uniform yet are always working more than twelve hours each day, some of the one hundred thousand war orphans who are shown as they were lined up to receive Red Cross gifts.

There were also pictures of Red Cross supplies arriving from Canada and of Junior Red Cross members in Korea. The closing thought of the film slides was that Korea's future lies in her children.

DISCUSSION

The second feature of the meeting was a panel discussion of Red Cross work in Prince Edward Island. Miss Iphigenie Arsenault, Red Cross Commissioner for the province outlined briefly the work of Junior Red Cross, which assists handicapped children, promotes their good health and world friendship; Red Cross Nursing Services which provide instruction in Home Nursing and a free loan service of sickroom supplies; Women's Work which provides sewn and knitted goods for relief at home and overseas; and the Red Cross Veterans' Service which includes visiting hospitalized veterans and providing them with treats, magazines and film showings. In some centres there are Red Cross Lodges for the use of veterans' families who come to visit them during periods of hospitalization.

Miss Arsenault then introduced members of the panel: Rev. M.D. B., the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Albany Palmer and family.
